"On the left bank of the Vistula the battle proceeds, developing along a front from Plock, Poland, to the River Warthe. On the front between Kozienice and Wyszki the Austrians have withdrawn. In the neighborhood of Czenstochowa, and towards the south the enemy has attempted an offensive, but this has failed.

"Our troops continue to advance.

"In Galicia, the Austrians are seeking to organize a defence on the San river in the Dounaulez region, west of the front comprising Zabno and Tarnow, and on the Wisloka, on the Jagielnica.

"In the region of the south of the Galician front, our troops are advancing.

The general staff of the Russian army in the Caucasus reports that the fighting in the region around Kepruk continues. There have been no engagements in the province of Zatchorik, in the valleys of the Bayazid and the Alaskert, or on the coast of the Black Sea.

His command of the British army in the South African war, his intense patriotism and his many great qualities of heart and intellect made him a distinguished and even a unique figure among those who wrought most and best for the Empire which he loved and served so well. He died as he had lived, the poet of duty. His memory will be honored and his death mourned throughout the Empire and nowhere more sincerely than in Canada."
