

# SHERIFF FREEZE DIES AT HOME IN HAMPTON

### General regret at passing of one of most popular officials County has ever had—Funeral tomorrow afternoon.

Hampton, N. B., Feb. 10.—Fred W. Freeze, high sheriff of Kings county, died here this morning, pneumonia was the cause. The late sheriff was in his 57th year and had resided in Hampton for nearly twenty-one years. Upon the death of the late Deputy Sheriff, who died in 1885, the deceased was appointed to that position and continued to hold that office under his father, the late Samuel N. Freeze, and under the late D. Beverly Hatfield. Upon the death of the latter in 1903 he was appointed and continued to fill the position in a most acceptable manner. His death at a comparatively early age is deeply deplored, a most genial and kindly disposition, quick to respond to all calls upon him, large hearted and generous, he contributed liberally to all charitable and philanthropic causes. As an official he was affable and courteous yet possessing sufficient of the fortiter in re to make him very efficient. The deceased was a member of the Corinthia Lodge No. 13, A. F. & A. M., and the funeral will be held under his auspices. He leaves him surviving two brothers, Samuel A. and Bliss, both of whom reside on the homestead at Sussex, B. Bliss McLeod, of the postal service, St. John, is an uncle. The funeral will be held on Saturday at one o'clock from the home in Sussex.

# TO PAY FOR FRENCH GOVT PURCHASES IN UNITED STATES

### British and French governments complete arrangements—Two National Banks will cooperate.

Paris, Feb. 10.—Minister of Finance Ribot told his colleagues in the cabinet council today that as a result of his visit to London with the governor of the Bank of France, from which they returned last night, the bank of England would lend assistance to the Bank of France to facilitate commercial credit in England, and that arrangements had been made between the two governments for payment for purchases made by the French government in the United States and Great Britain. M. Ribot said that the London Stock Exchange would admit securities belonging to French holders to be dealt in on condition that the intermediaries should be the Bank of France and the Bank of England and that the proceeds of the sales should be employed in paying for purchases in England.

# SILVER SHELL WHICH WAS IN COLLISION HAS REACHED PLYMOUTH

Plymouth, England, Feb. 10.—The steamer Silver Shell, from New York, which was in collision with the Japanese steamer Takata Maru on Feb. 1, arrived here today with the crew of the Takata Maru on board. The Silver Shell's starboard was damaged, one of her plates had been pierced above the water line, and her stern was twisted to port above and below the water line.

# SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency in the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency, where residence is performed in the vicinity. Duties—Six months residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three consecutive years, or a homesteaded patent may be obtained on a farm of at least 10 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteaded patent may be obtained on a quarter-section alongside his homestead. # FEW SENT STATEMENTS TO THE CITY ASSESSORS

The time fixed by law during which the citizens are "required" to file statements of their incomes and possessions for the benefit of the assessors' work has expired, but as usual, there has not been a general response. It has been customary to accept statements up to the time the assessment is made up, but even with this extra time allowance, it has been unusual for the number of statements received to go as high as two hundred. If a tax payer does not file such a statement he is supposed to have no right to object to the size of his tax bill, as he leaves it to the assessors to do the best they can according to their own judgment. However, the city has not been inclined to do this, and it is unreasonable and the appeals committee has power to deal with cases in which it can be shown that an injustice has been done.
