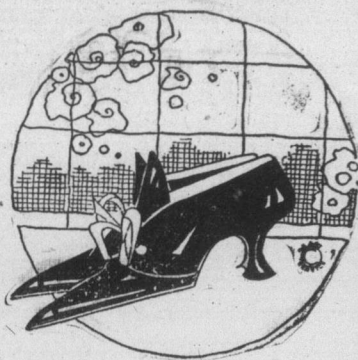

Five Physicians Are Removed

ERASED FROM ONTARIO MEDICAL COUNCIL ROLL. TWO ARE SUSPENDED

Toronto June 26—The Ontario Medical Council to-day decided to erase from the roll of practicing physicians the names of Dr. Percy Gardner Dr. I.N. Cherniak and Dr. Raymond Rheume of Windsor and of Dr. H.H. Moorehouse and Dr. A. Ruppert of Toronto and suspend for three months Dr. E.P. Kelley, Toronto and Dr. D. McEdwards, Hamilton. Their offenses were breaches of the Ontario Temperance Act. Eresure from the roll means that a doctor may apply for reinstatement at a later date, but as the council only meets regularly once a year that period must elapse before a doctor can be reinstated.
