

BRADSTREET'S REVIEW.

Improved Business Outlook—Features of Trade.

New York, Aug. 23rd.—Special telegrams to Bradstreet's from all the principal grain markets of the world indicate a fairly active movement of general merchandise at twenty-eight of the larger cities, a special improvement being noted at Pittsburgh, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Chicago, St. Louis, Minneapolis, Kansas City, New Orleans, Richmond, and Savannah. The volume of sales reported from almost all directions exceeds the total in August in preceding years, a distribution of dry-goods being conspicuous. The business outlook is improved in Illinois, Iowa, Nebraska, Missouri, and Kansas since the crop prospect has been

The total bank clearings at thirty-day maturity amounted to \$356.0 million, up from last year of twelve per cent. The increased demand for and use of bank clearing services has been extending westward, and Cincinnati is expected to continue to do as well as City announced strong or stringent money markets, with funds relatively tight. The uncertainty of the money market, and trouble in the trunk line pool, have caused the market to pull back the \$15,000,000 bond call and the gold from Europe caused a sharp pull in the partial return. Money on call ruled at 10 to 11 and as low as 4 to 5. Commercial paper firm at 6. Exchange very firm.

The dry-goods trade is satisfactory, with jobbers for autumn buying promising. The clothing trade is also showing advances have been maintained and

Wool is quiet and unchanged from last week. Buyers are being asked to place orders for the coming season's transactions are smaller than a year ago. Light weight goods on which prices of the season are expected to be somewhat higher.

The best makes of Eastern pig iron are in demand. To displace iron from the west, buy, current market is being put on contract. An advancement is being made in the price of pig iron, 10 cents more has been obtained on some brands, while at Cincinnati and Chicago the price has advanced 15 to 20 cents, twenty-five cents more per ton in some instances.

Grain and meat market is being influenced chiefly by increased sales for export, backed by renewed advice of the government to increase production and lower, with an improved crop outlook.

Hog products are featureless, except for lard, in which the effort to corner the market has been abandoned, regarded as a fictitious advance.

The extreme heat has not been favorable to the market.

AGRICULTURE'S DOWNFALL.

It is believed here that when the prince hears that the British government is ready to return at once to Sofia. His presence there, it is believed, will quell all the rumors of his death in the Balkan country.
