

Port Credit Bell tolls for Sabres

Steady defensive performances and sharp netminding by Leslie Bell enabled Sabres to make a strong bid for the lofty heights of fifth place in Port Credit Hockey Association league standings.

Buried deep in the cellar, Sabres were two games without giving up a solitary goal and collected three valuable points for their sharpness as they edged top-of-the-table Rangers 1-0 and followed with a scoreless

deadlock against Canucks. The three points boosted Sabres' total to seven, the same as Hawks.

Goalkeeper Bell tolled loudest for Sabres, thwarting the best offensive thrusts Rangers and Canucks sharpshooters threw his way.

Alan Whidden hit the goal which spoiled the holiday season for Rangers. In the scoreless tie Canuck guardian James McIntyre matched Bell save for save.

Dave York and Steve Flowers traded scoring punches as Kings held Rangers to a 1-1 tie in another encounter.

Solid goaltending by Dan Fraser and a goal by Paul Maschry gave Wings a 1-0 win over Hawks, marking the second straight game that Hawks didn't score a goal. Earlier, they played to a scoreless tie with Kings. Ken Skyes and Mark Butler were in goal.

Ex-PCO junior A star Paul Cioci is expected to see action, too.

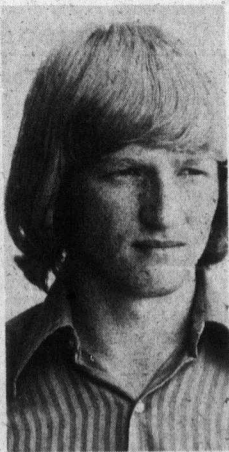
"We will have Toronto Argonaut star Dave Rahmey make a guest appearance, too," says McCausland.

You can bet the Grey Cup that "Dave The Knife" won't cut as thick a slice of the crowd's fancy as this lacrosse on the rocks affair.

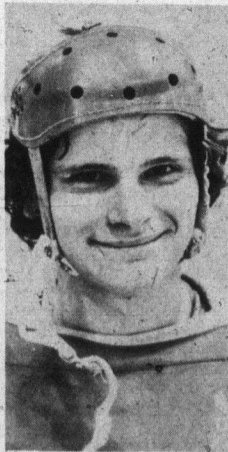
TOTH-SOME MORSELS — Super jockey Sandy Hawley may ride in a special international race in New Zealand against some of the world's top competitors in February.

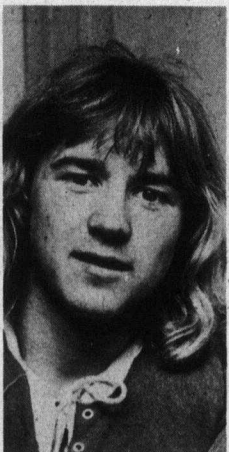

"Super Stopper" Fred Gardner, an 18-year-old University of Western Ontario student touted far and wide as the sharpest netminder in the provincial junior A lacrosse circuit, received his just reward when he was acclaimed as the Most Valuable Player for the Mississauga PCO's junior A team during the 1973 season.

The PCO organization held its year-end Awards Night at Sheridan Mall Auditorium, paying tribute to the top performers in junior A, B and C colours.

Gardner, one of the prime reasons behind PCO's fifth-place finish in regular season play and a respectable showing in the Ontario junior A loop's playoff series, was an obvious choice for the MVP award.

Following the PCO's exit of the playoffs, Gardner was "borrowed" by Peterborough for the Minto Cup showdown and helped the Eastern Canadian representatives to the national championship. Peterborough edged British Columbia's Richmond Roadrunners in seven games. Gardner shared netminding duties with regular Peterborough stopper Tim Barrie three times and was in goal for three full games, including the do-or-die cliffhanger in which Peterborough clinched the silverware with a 10-9 triumph.

Gardner still has two years of junior lacrosse eligibility remaining — a prospect which produces instant smiles of delight among the Mississauga club's management.

Forward George Chandler, already acclaimed as

the league's Rookie of the Year, received a similar recognition from PCO's. In breaking into the circuit with a bang, Chandler hit for 14 goals and gained seven other points in the assists department for a 21-point total in regular play. In five playoff encounters, he had a

10-point series, including five goals.

Youthful Robbie Gemmell, who topped the league in two departments (most points by a rookie—109, 58 goals and 51 assists; and most points in a single game — 12 against St. Catharines) walked off with the Leading Scorer's

Distance runner Cindy McKinnon off to fast start in indoor season

TORONTO — Cindy McKinnon started the new indoor track and field season with a burst of speed that left the Mississauga Track and Field Club's coaching staff smiling with satisfaction.

The 16-year-old middle-distance runner, a relative newcomer to the Mississauga club, failed to produce a miracle and earn a place on the Ontario team which will compete in the U.S. regional indoor finals in New Hampshire next month, but she did turn in an excellent 5:10.7-minute time in finishing a close third in the women's open one-mile feature event at CNE South Industries Building.

It was the first indoor meet of the new campaign, attracting 225 athletes to the CNE Saturday. Prize for the top two finishers was a trip to the U.S. regional championships.

"Cindy's time was excellent," commented MTFC middle-distance coach Ian Costello.

In finishing third, Miss McKinnon beat several nationally-ranked competitors and established herself

as a girl to watch. Mississauga had two other entries. After winning his 60-yard heat with a 6.6-second effort, Duncan Card managed a fourth place in the final, chipping two-tenths of a second off his qualifying

time. Bantam age-division runner Susan Armstrong, coached by George Van Zeyl, was clocked 1:29.4 in the open women's 600-yards. This weekend, MTFC entries will compete in an all-comers meet.
