3. The Supt. said, <sup>2</sup>they had no doubt, heard of the great outrage committed by some persons, (he hopes, none of the Six Nations,) in cutting and destroying the belting attached to the Saw Mill, to the cost of about fifty dollars, besides, stealing a bag of flour and two bags of chopstuffs.

Every <sup>one</sup> ~~person~~ of the Six Nations is interested in the protection of their property, and should endeavor to find out the perpetrators, and have them punished, - and, it <sup>might</sup> ~~would~~ be well, to appoint a night watchman for a time. If the property is to be subject to such malicious acts, it will be impossible to <sup>retain</sup> ~~get~~ a tenant for the Mills.

Mr. Cleghorn informed him that Mr. Baxter, having got some other employment, has transferred his lease to Mr. Cornish, a practical <sup>and</sup> ~~and~~ <sup>trusty</sup> Miller of Brantford.

The loss of the belting, has caused the stoppage of the Saw Mill until other belting is provided, which should be done by the Council until some other arrangement may be made.

The Mills are still under the control of the Commission of the Ontario Government.
