in the matter, He stated that he had other creditors besides the Domission Bank, and intimated that he was willing to divide up the money due him amongst all "our" creditors if he could get a settlement, but that he was unwilling to recognise the bank alone.

The matter now having assumed a different aspect the case was submitted to the Department of Justice, which expressed the following opinion-"I do not think the Dominion Bank has as a creditor of sutter "Gellespie any power to garnishee money in the hands of the Grown, nor "do I find in the order of the local Judgeof September 25rd ,1902, "any thing to show that garnishee process was issued against the "Indian Agent. Under these circumstances the Crown is free to pay the money to the Indians if it thinks proper." This Department in reply asked the Deputy Minister of Justice whether if Mr Gallespie obtained a joint agreement from his creditors to accept a proportionate payment of moneys retainedfrom the Indians by the Departmentthere would be any legal objection to paying the moneys to the creditors . upon such an agreement. The Deputy Minister of Justice wrote in reply-"If Mr Gillespie can obtain a joint agreementfrom his creditors "to accept a proportionate paymentof the moneye retained from the "Indians by the Department (which agreement would of course include the Dominion Bank) there would not be any legal objection to paying "the money under the agreement". Mr Gallespie was advised to this effect on the 9th August, 1904 (the letter being addressed to him at Vancouver). In August 1905 Messre Baxter & McLellan of Vancouver wrote the Department asking to have the money paid over to them for Mr Oillispie. A reply was sent to them similar to the letter just referrid to addressed to Mr Gillespie. Neither he or his lawyers have mine, been heard from.

It February, 1806 Mr D. Inglis Grantwrote stating an arrangement ad leen arrived at and that held in his possession an order from Claspie to the Dominion Bank, consenting to the payment by the Department of the sum of \$500.00 of the amounts held back by a Department or maturing at Exextent that time. He added - Will "you indly write me stating whether the Department will recognize only it is consent, and will pay the sum of American five hundred doll to the bank as requested by him." The Department replied
