a newly married couple here. "The St. Catharines girl stayed two years and then came home to see her mother, who was dying. She shouldn't have done it, for the woman had been anything but a mother. The man in St. Catharines wrote me after-wards, speaking in the highest terms of the girl, but said that, owing to the

of the girl, but said that, owing to the illness of his wife, he was unable to keep the place open and had been forced to get another girl.

"While here, the girl buried her mother and then, homeless and without friends, she had no place to go. Chance—or was it a higher power—gave the girl an opportunity for a home with an aged couple in the countary. The wages were not much, but she had a good home, was well fed and dressed. The girl, who had never had anything before, had at last found comfortable home where she was

respected and loved. "She lived here three years till one the butcher, a man by no means what he ought to be saw the young woman in the katchen. Going to the old folks he said-Do you know who you have here? That woman in the kitchen is a born prostitute. She has a suspended sentence against her for prostitution. She was tried in the Chatham police court.

"The man butle knew the fell work he had accomplished. At his door morally lies the death of that girl, because she died before her time as a result of his information. The aged couple went to the girl and asked her about it. She denied it:

"She then sat down and wrote to me, the saddest, most pitiful letter I have ever read. It made me really weep when I read it.

easy as possible.'
