The state of my health having of late put tout of my power to render that assistance in the execution of the duties of the bench, which : my duty to tender my resignation of the office of Chief Justice of the Province, to His Exceilency the Governor General, and he has. "All partinss from friends are painíul, end, had I consulted my own fecliogs on this red from the thench insilence. But the recollection of the uninterrupted harmony which has subsisted between us, during the long peto preside in this Court, would not suffer me to think of so cold a separation,-1 have, therefore, detaind dyou, that i may avail myself of this opoitunity, briefly, but sincerely, to assure you that I carry wit, me into retirement the same feelinzw of tsteem and respect, for the profession at large, which I have ever enter-tained,-a prateful sense of the conduct which I have experienced from you on all occasions, -and of the able aid and assistance, which rom you my learned hothers, and from you, gentlemen of the bar, in your respective stations, ard in the exercise of the arduous dutiee of this tribunal, I have invariably received. "Accept my most siacere thanks for the past, accompanied by my best ard earnes wishes for your health. prosperity and happiness in future ; and allow me to hope, that 1 shall carry with me into private life, your codtinued esteem and fricndship.
