Canadian Northern Railway

Rapid progress is indicated by this railway's report to 30th June last. Increases are shown over the previous year in gross earnings to the extent of \$747,000, and in net earnings \$254,100. The mileage has also increased during the year from 1,350 to 1,476, or 540 miles, nearly a mile and three-quarters for every working day of the year, winter and summer.

Vegetable Growers

The recently formed Ontario Vegetable Growers' Assn. will organize branches of the Association in the leading cities and towns of Ontario. The Association will receive a grant of \$800 from the government this year which will be used largely to hold a convention and to give prizes for vegetables at the horticultural exhibition to be held in Toronto in November.
