But she will not allow disintegration if she can prevent it, because such an end to the dual Monarchy means the erection of a Slav state between Prussia and Turkey, the building of a great wall across South-eastern Europe, where lies the Balkan road to Asia Minor and India.

But, humiliating as is this prospect from which even victory over Italy might not save her, it is more perilous to the world in the long run than the continued independent existence of the Habsburg hegemony. Austria-Hungary absorbed into the Prussian-ruled confederacy will be

come a source of strength to the Hohenzollern, that the free nation of the world cannot contemplate with happiness. It means the consolidation of autocratic power in Central Europe, the creation of an empire of 120,000,000 people as the nucleus of world domination.

The military efficiency of Prussia will reorganize Austria. New and heavier yokes will be forged for the necks of the subject races now struggling to free.

Magyar and German will join hands in crushing Czechoslovakia and Jugoslav, with Bulgaria and Turk to help as a native milestone. The emancipation of Eastern Europe, the liberation of the Balkans, the redemption of Poland, the Baltic states and Russia will become tasks of almost insuperable difficulty.

To chance that victory wholly on the west front to prevent the absorption of the dual Monarchy, is to take too great a chance. We are asking much on the west front when we allow the plans of Germany in South-eastern and Eastern Europe to develop unchecked by any direct opposition. The victory must come quickly, and in overwhelming measure, if it is to clean up a situation so vast and complex.

If it should be accomplished by an Italian offensive that carried the war over the Austrian frontier to Ljubljana and the gates of Vienna, then it might meet the need. The salvation of the dual Monarchy from dissolution would be almost impossible, even for Berlin, under such conditions. But it is to be questioned whether Italy can, in time, win back across her plains and the mountain barriers of the Isonzo.

More and more it is impressed upon us that we are overlooking an opportunity in our apparent neglect of the Macedonian front. Difficult as this front is from the standpoint of terrain, it is certainly not more difficult than the Italian front. And here only can we drive a wedge between the Central Empires and their Balkan allies; here lies the shortest road to the disaffected regions of Austria-Hungary. America should declare war at once with Bulgaria and Turkey and push vigorously a military expedition, aided by the Greeks, into this field.

Dentally Fit Canadians

Ottawa, June 28.—The following has been received by the Militia Department from Sir Edward Kemp, Minister of Overseas Military Forces:

"It will be of interest to the Canadian public to know that every man in the Canadian army in England is 'dentally fit'. One of the first things that happens to a soldier on his arrival in England is to have his mouth examined. A nominal roll is then made out, and the details of the dental condition are set after each name.

The troops are kept at the segregation camp, Farnham, for a time after their arrival. During their sojourn there all extraneous things are taken off and the nominal rolls are then sent on to the training camps, to the Assistant Director of Dental Services.

Examinations on Parade. "At the training camp all the men are paraded to dental clinics and are made 'dentally fit'. What this means to the comfort of the men and their general health will be especially appreciated in Canada, where the importance of care of the teeth is so well understood.

"Before going to France all the men are again paraded. They are given a thorough examination and are made 'dentally fit' before they are allowed to go to the front. The Canadian Army Dental Corps has 44 dental officers operating in hospitals in addition to those working in training areas.

The special clinic equipped and donated by the Ontario Government at Orpington Hospital is doing specially effective work in connection with men who have been wounded in the face, who have sustained fractured or splintered jaws, or other complex injuries.

Retirement of Rev. J. P. Wilson

The Peterborough Review gives the following appreciation of the Rev. J. P. Wilson. Dr. Wilson is well known in this city having occupied the pulpit of Bridge St. Methodist Church a few years ago.

"Age is not, after all, a question of passing time, but rather of the spirit of the mortal upon whose head the years accumulate. No man can be regarded as old while his eyes are still set on the course before him and in whose heart there still lies the hope of better and greater things to come. It is only when he directs his gaze backward, when he begins to boast of the achievements of the past and to maintain that the best days of earth are gone, that he can be said to be possessed of the infirmities that come with life's lengthening shadows.

Judged by this test, Rev. J. P. Wilson, just retiring from the Methodist ministry, is still a man young in spirit and in hopes. After forty-five years of earnest labor in his chosen profession he believes that his half has not been accomplished and that the best is yet to come. In his farewell address at St. Paul's Church last night, he said: 'I have seen the Methodists united in one great body. I have seen the Presbyterians, too, united in one body, and my hope is that the day will yet come when the words of the Master will be fulfilled and there will be one flock and one Shepherd.'

Dr. Wilson may not live to see that day, but his is the comforting assurance that his long years of earnest endeavor have helped to hasten the time. If all his clerical contemporaries had been inspired by the same broad spirit of Christianity a universal church would be much nearer still.

It was a unique and graceful tribute that the church people of Peterborough paid Dr. Wilson last night in the service held to take leave of him. He retired universally esteemed, not only in this city but by all the people in any corner of the universe in which he has ministered. And now that the opportunity comes to him to rest from his labors, all will join in the wish that his will be the calm and the light that the eventide brings to the faithful.
