HAITI DECLARES WAR AGAINST GERMANY

Port-au-Prince, Haiti, July 15—The Council of State, acting in accordance with the legislative powers given it under the new Haitian Constitution, has unanimously voted the declaration of war upon Germany demanded by the President of the Republic.

Haiti is the twenty-second nation to declare war on Germany. Seven other countries have broken diplomatic relations with Germany since the outbreak of the West Indian Republic had protested against Germany's unrestricted submarine warfare.
