

BIG STRIKE AT ROSSLAND; GOLD AVERAGING \$3000 A TON

GREATEST FIND IN HISTORY OF MINE—SLAB OF ORE SEVEN FEET IN LENGTH DISCOVERED—WILD EXCITEMENT IN DISTRICT—GREAT EFFORTS TO PRESERVE SECRECY.

NELSON, B. C., June 27.—The greatest strike in the history of Rossland was made last Tuesday. Every effort has been made to preserve secrecy, but the following particulars are correct. On Tuesday last a slab of ore over seven feet in length taking four men to move, was brought up out of the War Eagle Mine and washed. It was pyrrhotite, containing free gold to the extent of \$800 to \$1,000 per ton. Free gold to a small extent has been known to exist in Rossland pyrrhotites. The present value is absolutely unknown, \$100 ore on the surface making the boom of 1895-1898. This is from the 1,500 foot level, sylvanite in knife

like streaks has been found on Annie of Leroi No. 2, running \$400 to \$800 to the ton but the present strike is of far greater dimensions. The general manager, W. H. Aldridge came up from the trail on a hurried visit and conferred with Superintendent Stewart, but no details have been given out to the public, the utmost reticence having been observed. Great excitement grips the district. It is expected that tremendous impetus will be given to Red Mountain properties in the neighborhood of the vein. The War Eagle Mine belongs to the Cons Mining and Smelting Co.
