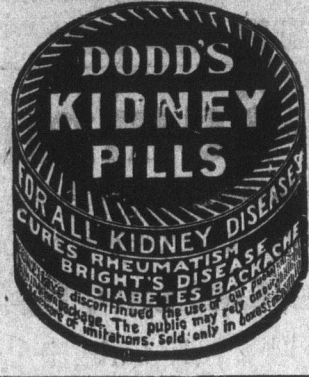

There is a tailor suggestion about all
this, but the handwork in finish takes
away the severity somewhat, as the
edge of the entire bolero is embroide-
red by hand. So are the high chemise
and stock and the turnover flat cuffs
of the elbow sleeve. It requires little
imagination to fancy how becoming
such a gown may be with a bodice
beited in with rose pink ribbon and a
single pink rose of great beauty fas-
tened to the corsage just where the
bolero meets.

A straw hat, a cluster of roses and
some tulle, fresh white gloves and
shoes and a white embroidered parasol,
coupled with youth and beauty, make
as captivating a picture.

FOR THE SMALL GIRL.

Four-in-hand Ties Smart on Sailor
Suits.

The little tailored linen and duck
dresses in variations of the Russian
blouse and sailor style to be worn by
small girls this spring and summer dis-
play an added charm in the effective
disposition of the colored collar, cuffs,

A New Skirt Hanger.

A skirt does not always keep its
shape when an ordinary hanger is
used, and so one ingenious woman has
evolved the following simple arrange-
ment for accommodating a consid-
erable number of skirts in the smallest
possible space.

First she screwed in a few inches
from the back of the closet on each
side a small brass hook such as is
used in china closets.

The next step was to get a piece of
strong but slender cord long enough
to extend across the closet from hook
to hook.

On this cord she strung a dozen or
more large safety pins by running the
cord through the opening in the clasp
of the pin.

She folds her skirts exactly in half,
sticks the point of a pin through the
waistband at back, front and halfway
between these two points; then she
fastens the safety pins, and her skirts
hang in their natural folds, with little
strain and away from the wall.

The pins slide freely up and down
the cord, and skirts may hang three
deep and not get crushed or wrinkled.

Amusement For the Tots.

However soon children tire of play-
ing with toys, they always find endless
amusement in making new playthings
for themselves. The fabrication of pa-
per dolls out of colored fashion plates
is a work which will easily serve to
pass away a wet afternoon in the
nursery. The figures should be cut
neatly round, pasted on to cardboard
and this in turn cut out, so as to stiffen
the figures, says Woman's Life. The
arms and legs can be made to move if
these are divided in the first instance,
mounted separately on cardboard and
attached to the dolls by means of small
paper fasteners, the heads being treat-
ed in like manner.

Use For Daily Papers.

HUNT FOR TREASURE.

Rector Joins In Romantic Quest In
Ruins of Ancient Hall.

The ruins of Bradley Old Hall, Der-
byshire, which were discovered re-
cently, are being unearthed, and a
large extent of the foundations has
been laid bare. As yet, however, the
cellars have not been entered, and a
subterranean passage, that for genera-
tions has had a reputed existence, has
not been discovered. But the archaeo-
logical interest in the investigations
is completely dwarfed locally by the
idea that hidden treasure may be
found. The story goes that Prince
Charles sent a company of his follow-
ers from Derby to Bradley to seize
a valuable collection of plate, and
that they found some, but not the
whole of it. The legend that a valu-
able hoard escaped their notice, and
remains buried in the ruins of the
old hall, has a tenacious hold in the
district, and only the most careful
search will dispel it. The Rector of
Bradley (the Rev. R. H. Tomlinson) is
an enthusiastic archaeologist, and is
taking a working share in the digging
out of the foundations. The rector
may be found, spade in hand, some
feet down among old walls and mul-
titudinous windows. In the midst of his
work the rector told an interviewer
that they had discovered a curious
chamber, four or five feet square, the
use of which was not quite clear. "We
had to cut through the bricks—and
such bricks—before it was revealed.

Carousal in the Cellars.
"It may have been a hiding-place
in troublous times, or perhaps a bin
for some of that special old port with
which Dr. Johnson was regaled. He
was a visitor at the Hall," said the
rector, "and greatly enjoyed the lux-
uries of the well-laden tables." The
rector would like to complete the
search of the ruins, and to penetrate
the whole range of cellars and pas-
sages, but for this funds will be need-
ed. A corroboration of the story of
the visit of the young Pretender's
followers to Bradley Hall is contain-
ed in Hutton's "History of Derby,"
published in 1797. It is there stated
that one James Sparks (an emissary,
it is thought, of a Scotch minister)
who sent a message from Bradley to
Prince Charles) guided a number of
soldiers to the old Hall, then in the
possession of Hugo Meynell. The
party had a carousal in the cellars,
and eventually the Highlanders de-
camped, leaving their companions help-
lessly drunk. Sparks discovered the
next day by the Loyalists, taken
before a magistrate, and committed.
He was ultimately removed to York,
there tried for high treason, condemn-
ed, and executed in 1746. Locally it
is argued that the Highlanders did
not travel from Derby all the way to
a remote place like Bradley, with
the Duke of Cumberland's army in
hot advance, for the sole purpose of
indulging in a drunken orgie. Was
it the treasure they were after, and
if so, did they get away with the
whole of it? Hutton's history states
that before the Prince re-commenced his
retreat northward from Derbyshire he
had replenished his war-chest to the
extent of some thousands of pounds.

King Promotes Official.

The King, according to a recent
issue of The Gazette, has given the
Master of the Horse, the Earl of Sel-
borne—a tremendous step in the order
of precedence.
Hitherto the Master of the Horse
has ranked between the comptroller
and the Vice-Chamberlain of the
Household, in the table of precedence.
For the future he will take prece-
dence of the Speaker, the Lords of
Appeal, the bishops and barons, vis-
counts, earls, marquises and dukes,
and will come immediately after the
Chamberlain of the King's Household.

The Master of the Horse has charge
of all matters relating to the sover-
eign's stables and horses. He has
the privilege of using any of his mas-
ter's horses, pages or footmen. His
processional place is next behind the
sovereign.
His dignity, however, depends on
the vitality of the Ministry which
appoints him, for his position is polit-
ical and he retires into private life
with the other members of a defeated
Government.

A Maori Funeral.
A strange scene occurred recently
at Parahiaka, on the West Coast of
New Zealand, at the funeral of Tohu,
a famous Maori prophet, who was cre-
dited by his followers with the attri-
butes of divinity and immortality, and
has caused great misgivings amongst
the faithful by dying. A dispute
arose as to whether the body should
be placed in a coffin provided by some
of the dead chief's followers. His re-
latives objected, and eventually it was
agreed that the coffin should be low-
ered into the grave first, and the body
placed on top of it. The coffin was
accordingly let down into the ground
and then smashed into matchwood. A
kapok mattress was then lowered, and
the body placed upon that. Numerous
mats were laid on top of the body and
the grave filled in. The burial cere-
mony was a great occasion for the
Maori population, and so much im-
portance was attached to it that the
native health officer telegraphed to
the Native Minister for permission
to have intoxicating liquor at the fun-
eral; but the request was not granted.

The Inventor of the Gyroscope.
"Mr. Brennan, whose gyroscope
train seems to be the nearest approach
to a flying-machine yet invented," says
The London Star, "an Irishman
by birth. As a very young man he
emigrated to Australia, and obtained
a place in a department store at Mel-
bourne. The proprietor received a
large consignment of clocks from
England, and found that they had
been damaged in transit. Young
Brennan showed mechanical aptitude
for the first time by setting them
right. From clocks he advanced (by
stages) to torpedoes, and had the sup-
reme good luck to sell the Brennan
torpedo to the British Government
for £120,000. Vast sums of money were
spent on its manufacture, and then,
in the autumn of last year, the Gov-
ernment decided to close the Brennan
torpedo factory at Gillingham, from
which it has been assumed that its
day is past."
