Alleged Discovery of Claim Had Defects, But His Lordship Finds That There Was No Conspiracy and That Defendants Were Justified In Contesting the Issue-As There Was No Fraud No Costs Are Given.

Toronto, June 26.-The Ontario Government has won in the Cobalt mining case that has developed such striking

Ottawa, June 26.-In the House yes ment that there were 2,000 men out of a total of 5,000 in the Niagara militim a total of 5,000 in the Niagara militia camp serving under assumed names, and that many first year men were be-ing set down as second and third year men so as to draw the increased pay. If such a state of things were true, said Col. Hughes, the offenders must have

committed forgery, and, moreover, the officers must be cognizant.

Sir Frederick Borden said that there were a number of men at camp at Niagara who appeared on the rolls under ssumed names, but that the number was greatly exaggerated. However, he had called the attention of the adjutant-general to the statement and the matter was being investigated.

Bell Telephone Legislation.

The House at its morning session considered at length in committee the bill to increase the capital stock of the Bell Telephone Co. There was a long discussion on the measure, and Mr. Maclean requested the first Minister to permit the bill to stand until the telephone. phone amendments to the Railway Act were disposed of, and warned the Government that he and other Conservatives would hold up the bill in committee indefinitely. This led to a conference at the noon-hour, and at 3 o'clock the Bell Co, bill was reported, but the same must stond for his desired. but the same must stand for third read ing until the House has passed general telephone legislation.

Branch Lines of G. T. P.

He insisted upon a branch being built to St. John, N. B., and ridicaled the position taken by Mr. Emmerson, that the moral obligation resting upon the G. T. P. to build to St. John was sufficient without any legal sanction.
