Prohibition a Boon to Students.

President Schurman, of Cornell University, has been closely identified with the campaign to make the city of Ithaca dry. In a letter recently published in the Ithaca Journal, he expressed the conviction that the elimination of the liquor traffic would be a good thing for the city and for the students of the university of which he is president. We quote in part President Schurman's letter: "The moral, economic and social arguments against drunkenness remain what they have always been. But even the moderate use of liquor is now coming under taboo, first, in consequence of the discoveries of the sciences dealing with the conditions of health and disease; secondly, the requirements of the railways and great manufacturing concerns for total abstinence by their employees; and thirdly, the experiences of the nations in the great world war to the effect that alcohol impairs the efficiency of fighting men, with the result that it has been partially or wholly prohibited in the belligerent countries. These considerations together have produced a great effect upon the public mind and unless I am greatly mistaken hosts of American citizens who only a few years ago, would have opposed prohibition are now in favor of it. I hope, therefore, that it will soon be made illegal to buy or sell alcohol or to import it or manufacture it in the city of Ithaca. With the rest of Thompson's county and the adjoining counties already under prohibition, this reform in Ithaca would, I believe, be a great boon to the students of Cornell University, as well as to the people of Ithaca."

New Market for California Grapes.

West may prove a death blow to the wine interests of California is the new plan being advocated by the viticulture department of the University of California to extract sugar from grapes. Not only will this new process revolutionize the existing industry of the state but the wine growers will have a new market for their product and their old reason for opposing prohibition will lose its force. Two colonies in British Columbia have been closed by the federal authorities, the change having been made that the colonies were interfering with the efficiency of men under training at the nearby Scott aviation field.

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Teachers' Salaries.

The Council of Public Instruction for the Province has, we learn, decided that the pay of teachers must be increased. The plan to be adopted, as far as we can at present ascertain, is to fix a minimum rate of pay for the several grades, or at the option of the section a sliding advance scale—50 per cent in the case of teachers who had heretofore received less than \$300 a year, 40 per cent in the case of teachers receiving heretofore from \$300 to \$500 per year, and a smaller rate of advance in the case of those previously receiving the larger amounts. It is felt that the profession has been very much underpaid, and that in consequence, the best teachers in the East are being lost in favor of the West. The increase will add, we believe, from \$120 to \$150 to the cost of the schools in the Town of Argenteuil.—Casket.

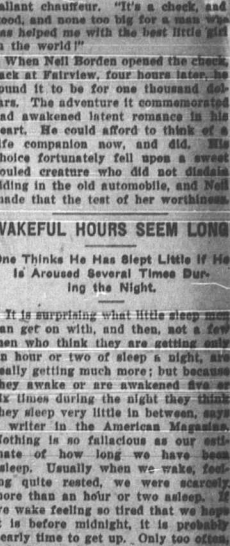

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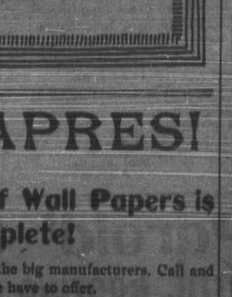
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
