Coffee, Vice-President of the Dominion Permanent Company, was seen by a reporter in Toronto, and said that so far as the company was concerned no proceedings had been taken, and the arrest was not made at the company's instance. Mr. Falconer has remitted to the company the money due by him, and had no funds of the company in his possession. He might have money belonging to other people, but there was no reason for a prosecution by the Dominion Permanent.

Mr. Falconer is known to a number in Guelph, he he'ving on a number of occasions given his pupils a sleightride to the city during the past few winters. On these occasions the party put up at the Central and American hotels.
