EXHIBITION GRANT.

City Council Places \$1,500 at Disposal of Building Committee and Guarantees \$1,000 More.

A meeting of the Finance Committee of the City Council was held at the city building yesterday afternoon, attended by all the members except Mr. Moore. The purpose of the meeting was to consider matters in connection with the grant to the exhibition society. It was decided to make the first sum voted, \$1,500, immediately available to the building committee of the exhibition, as that amount is provided for in this year's assessment.

Concerning the second sum granted to the exhibition society, \$1,000, it was decided that since no provision had been made in the assessment for the extra grant, and there was no department or fund from which it could be drawn, that all the Council could do this year would be to guarantee the amount named, \$1,000, to the exhibition society, the sum to be paid after next year's assessment is made.
