If anything were wanting to complete the proof, your "most amply supplies it." "Is there any other claim to exclusive power and influence, by the same persons, in the same spheres, and in the same institutions educational? Does it not establish one *Episcopal University*, prove a monopoly, prevent any others from being established, and thus create a monopoly?" Sir, I am astonished that you can see no reason in this claim, which to me seems very monstrous, when I look at the circumstances of the colony, and the vast body of the population nearly excluded from an equal participation in the seats and emoluments connected with the first university in the Province, which for a long time must have remained the only one. This University was not only endowed with nearly 320,000 acres of the Crown lands, and a sum of £1,000 sterling per annum, for

seven years, appropriated from the revenues of the
town, for the erection of the buildings, but was to
have the right of electing a member of the House of
Assembly. And yet, as Sir JAMES MACINTOSH volun-
tarily in the House of Commons, the charter was of
