FEW MARRIED PAUPEERS.

Notwithstanding the jokes on the married man, he is nearly 100 per cent proof against the kind of adversity that casts the individual on the rocks of disaster and makes him a human derelict.

This is the statement of Brigadier George Reid, in charge of the Salvation Army's home. According to Reid a report just compiled by him shows that less than 1 per cent of the men seeking shelter and refuge in the industrial home are married. Reid accounts for this by the fact the married men through the responsibilities carried by them develop a resourcefulness that the single man fails in.

"I have talked to hundreds of men coming to the home and find the cases pretty much the same," said Reid. "Something stifles the man's ambition in life, or else nothing has entered his life to develop his spark of ambition strong enough to make it withstand adversity."

"The few married men that drift in here are men whose homes have been broken up. They are comparatively easy cases to restore, however. The single man is our hardest problem, and even he is capable of redemption if we can find a sustaining interest to engage his attention."

FINANCING HYDRO-ELECTRIC

Guelph Mercury.—Sir Adam Beck, after an interview with members of the Ontario Government to confer with them on Auditor Clarkson's report, has publicly expressed his belief that the Hydro-electric Commission will continue to receive the Government's steady support in its policy of developing electric energy and acquiring falling-water franchises for that purpose. This should set at rest all unwarranted and unauthorized reports about the government putting on Hydro-electric production in the near or remote future. There will be open and frank discussion about details as each individual project comes up for approval, but it may, and should be taken for granted, that whenever the Hydro-electric Commission has a proposal to announce it has first been submitted to the government. The general public is not a body of experts, and neither is the Hydro-electric Commission, but the Commission has its staff of officials and the public will trust the Government.

POLICEWOMEN GET MOVIE PEST, WHO IS PUT IN JUG

BUFFALO, April 14.—In the conviction of August Wehlan, 38 years old, of No. 220 North Division street by Lillian Morrison and Lillian F. by alleging that he was encouraged, but Mrs. Morrison absolutely denied that, saying she tried to avoid the man.

1,000 IRIS COLLEENS REACH AMERICA: MORE ARE EXPECTED TO FOLLOW

NEW YORK, April 14.—More than 1,000 iris today opened what is expected to be a great influx of immigration from Ireland. The girls, most of whom arrived on the steamship Altic, went to the homes of friends or relatives in this city, and the Rev. Anthony Grogan of the omc for Irish Immigrant girls said their arrival would help relieve the shortage of domestic servants.

Only seven girls were detained for failure to meet immigration requirements, including the filtered test, which debarred aliens at Ellis Island were averaging from 3 to 5 per cent of arrivals. Immigration authorities said that many Irish girls were anxious to come to the United States, but that hitherto it had been difficult for them to obtain passports.

Penalty Every person required to do so within the time subject to a penalty of the amount of the tax. Any person, whether who fails to make a return duly required according to the Act, shall be liable to a penalty of 10 per cent of the amount of the tax which the defaulting person may information required be liable, on summary not exceeding \$10,000, or more or to both fine and imprisonment.

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
