The Toilet Table.

As an appendage to a bath two ounces of glycerine in two quarts of water will render the skin fresh and delicate. For the face, oatmeal made into paste with two parts of glycerine and one of water may be applied at night, under a mask, as a complexion improver.

For chapped hands, make camphor of one and one-half ounces of spermaceti tallow, four tablespoonfuls of oil of sweet almonds and three-fourths of an ounce of gum-sassafras pulverized fine. Put on back of stove until dissolved, stirring constantly, using just enough heat to melt the ingredients together.
