Science and the Fishery.

We are glad to find the Board of Trade has taken up the question of Technical Education in Newfoundland, as it affects the staple industry of the country, and that the Board has collected considerable information relating to Fishery Schools abroad. We are also pleased to find that the Board is interested in scientific investigation as to our fisheries. It is indeed remarkable that a country which has been almost entirely dependent on the fisheries in the past has done so little in this direction. When the Fisheries Department was organized nearly twenty years ago, an opportunity was afforded to create machinery to investigate what were the actual fishery resources of Newfoundland and Labrador, and particularly what were the values and locations of the banks off the coast of Labrador. There should be a competent staff of scientists attached to that department and when information had been collected and collated in the way the Imperial Institute collates information, a basis would be formed for getting out of these resources more than is done to-day by their better exploitation. There must be an extraordinary large amount of information also in the possession of our fishermen, particularly those who have spent a life time at the fishery. This of course has been so for generations, but the unfortunate part of it is that it mostly disappears with the death of the fishermen, as their exerts no public means of collecting this information and keeping a public record of it, and the only part which remains is such information as is handed down from generation to generation, from father to son, and exists in the memory of these still alive. A natural corollary of scientific investigation and development of our fishery resources is the fishery school, and the gradual formation of a fishery department in schools of settlements which are mainly engaged in the fishery.

Ford's "Peace Party" on Liner in Harbor.

The Holland-American Liner Noordam, which put in here yesterday short of coal, resumed her voyage this forenoon, she being bound to New York from Rotterdam. The ship got 300 tons of Admiralty coal, which was half the amount asked for, but nevertheless was all that could be spared. Before making her departure the brass band on board the ship rendered several selections, which together with the singing and cheering of the passengers and crew, entertained an immense gathering of people, who were assembled on Harvey's pier where the liner had been berthed. On board the Noordam are fourteen members of the Ford Peace Party. Not long since they crossed on the "Oscar II" and are now returning to New York, after having visited Norway, Denmark and Holland.

Another Steamer Here Short of Coal

LOST A MAN OVERBOARD. The Norwegian steamer Ontanda entered this port this morning short of coal. She was 31 days out from Copenhagen, bound to New York, via, in ballast. She reports having experienced tempestuous weather crossing the Atlantic, snow storms being frequent. The ship being light received a bad crubbing but she did not meet with any damage. However, a sad fatality occurred one night last week, when a member of the crew was washed overboard and never heard of afterwards. At the time a heavy gale raged and the vessel shipping a huge sea carrying with it from the deck a trimmer who had just come off duty. The Ontanda was never heard before. She is 2,159 tons gross and 2,232 net and built in 1895. Arrangements will be effected this evening, we understand, to give the ship a small supply of Welsh steam coal. Mr. Tasker Cook is acting as her agent here.
