Yesterday's Sports.

SHRUBB, WORLD'S CHAMPION, GIVES EXHIBITION OF REAL RUNNING.

A great number of people attended yesterday's sports at St. George's Field, and the gate receipts, about \$700 were the biggest in the record of the field. Needless to state, Alfred Shrubb, World's Champion Marathon runner, was the big attraction, and the day being delightfully fine, with just enough breeze to keep everybody but the baseball fans cool, the sports lovers turned up in their thousands. The first item was a ball game between the B.L.S. and the Wanderers, the latter winning by 8 runs to 3. The footer game between the City and a team from the Grampian's passengers and crew followed. The Citizens winning by one goal to nil. Now came the event of the day, when Mr. Alfred Shrubb, World's Champion Marathon runner, stepped out onto the course in running shorts and with Atkins and Bright pacing him started off on his five mile run around the field. Thirty five complete circles had to be run, seven making a mile. Shrubb covered the first mile in 4 mts. 55 secs.; the second in 5 mts. 14 secs.; the third in 5 mts. 24 secs.; the fourth in 5 mts. 20 secs.; and the fifth in 5 mts. 12 1-5 seconds, or the entire five miles in 26 mts. 05, 1-5 seconds his own record, being also that of the world, being 25 mts. 58 4-5 seconds, having done this in London, Eng., 1904. For the last mile Mr. J. Kavanagh runner of local repute stepped out to pace Shrubb, so that he would put forth good efforts. Shrubb's running was very pretty to see, his leg action being from the knees down, and as he circled the field in his graceful, easy, stride, the thousands of spectators lining the field cheered and hurraed in real old-time enthusiasm. Altho Atkins had a lap's start, Shrubb gained on him twice in the five mile run. Seen by the Telegram reporter immediately upon finishing the run, Mr. Shrubb told of his efforts. "The field is a good one," he said, "and the weather, despite the rather unfavorably strong breeze, is just nice. Do I feel tired or winded? Not at all. I am as fresh now almost, as when I started. A large crowd closed in on Shrubb as soon as he had finished and it was a minute or so before they could be dissuaded from patting him on the back and shaking hands with him. He is a sporty little man, with unlimited pluck and perseverance and has undoubtedly endeared himself to St. John's, if yesterday's cheering and applause may be taken as a criterion. A ball game between the Cubs and Red Lions, in which the former won by one run to nil, brought to a conclusion the most enjoyable sports day held in the city for a long time.
