A Pioneer of Peaceful Penetration.

On Sept. 18, 1714, George I. landed at Greenwich, and the rule of the Hanoverian House began over Great Britain. It did not open with the most promising auspices, For one thing George's consort was missing, and never came to England, her connection with the handsome Spanish adventurer, Konigsmarck having caused her confinement at Ahlden, where she spent the remainder of her life. Again, although George's eldest son was with him, the two notoriously were on bad terms, and throughout the reign their quarrels were a fruitful source of scandal and weakness. But worse still in the opinion of the people was the invasion of foreign favourites. Among the men, Bernstorff, Bothmar, and Robethon engrossed all influence and were more than suspected of selling it. Then there were the two mistresses: Schulenberg, afterwards Duchess of Kendal and Munster, and Kielmansegg, made Countess of Darlington, both of them noted for their rapacity. "Goot when the object of a dangerously hostile demonstration on the part of disgusted Londoners; "we haf come over here for all your goots!" "Yes, d--n you!" retorted a voice; "and for all our chattels, too!" The remark was just; it was an early example of "peaceful penetration," carried on with characteristic German effrontery. 


