At St. Thomas's.

The Sixth Commandment, "Thou shalt not kill," formed the theme of the Rector's sermon at St. Thomas's Church last evening. Among other things, the preacher emphasized that murder—the crimson sin of the soul—consisted not only of homicide, and the act of killing, but included religious intolerance, bigotry and persecution. As the subject was much too wide for one address, the preacher confined himself, more or less, to one point, that of Hate, pointing out that Hate was and is contrary to individual and social welfare, and the opposite of Love, the constructive element in human life. Hate kills redemption, because hate displaces the meek and forgiving spirit. Hate isolates man from society, inasmuch as it destroys the primal virtues of love, pity, benevolence. Incidentally the preacher referred to the two chief factors in trying to better the world—Socialism and Christianity. Both movements are common in their vision and conception, but are unlike in that Christianity preaches Love as the panacea of the world's ills, while the exponents of Socialism preach class hatred, forgetting that class hatred does not make for regeneration, as class hatred as well as personal hatred is forbidden by the sixth commandment. Continuing, the preacher showed that in response to the material, philosophic and artistic questions of to-day the answer comes back that hate is unprofitable, and this contention was borne out by many historical and Biblical references. Hate itself is murder, and as Cain was branded, so to-day society brands the hater, inasmuch as the individual going about hating his fellowmen, is shunned by all, as being outside the social pale. Then even as the crimson mark is still in evidence, so also there is a crimson wall going up to Heaven continually from the murdered, including those murdered by the wheels of industry, but the deepest wall goes up from the murderer himself. As for the cure, that can only come from the crimson stain, the Cross of Christ, symbolising the Divine Love, that love which alone of all the virtues can dispel the blackness of hate. Love is the keynote of Christianity, and only by following the Christian doctrines of praying for your enemies, and living for others, can the cause of all the world's discord be destroyed.

In beautiful and eloquent language, the preacher closed one of the most heart-touching discourses that has yet been delivered on the Commandments, and was listened to with the deepest attention by the large congregation which crowded the sacred edifice.—S.J.H.

Obituary.

NICHOLAS P. WHITE.

News reached the city last week of the death of Mr. Nicholas P. White, Postal Telegraph Operator at Bonavista. Mr. White had been ailing for some time, and the end, which came peacefully on the 29th, ulto., was not altogether unexpected. He was one of the "Old Guard" of the Postal Telegraphs, and was considered one of the most expert Telegraphers in the Dominion. The "Postal" has lost an efficient and trustworthy official, and the public of Bonavista one in whom implicit confidence was placed in the transaction of his official duties. He was a citizen of sterling worth and unblemished character, and was possessed of an intellect of rare ability. His literary attainments were of a high order, and though of a retiring and unassuming disposition, he was recognized as one who had carefully garnered the wisdom and culture of many years intelligent and judicious study.

At literary and social gatherings he was ever in demand, and for many years took an active part in the affairs of Terra Nova Club, of which he was the respected President.

Left to mourn are a widow (nee Miss Daly of Boston), and a sister at Bonavista, and three brothers: John J. White, of the firm of McCormack & Walsh at Catalina, M. A. White, Travelling Auditor, R.N.C., City, and Thos. J. White, Boston.—Com.
