Prohibition goes beyond reason, and though alcohol is scientifically known as a narcotic, he would not say that it was not useful.

The resolutions were read, and a standing vote taken. It was carried amid thunderous applause, only two persons dissenting. The original committee of thirty were again nominated as a working body with power to add to their numbers, which will be increased to fifty. Any who wish to work on the committee may send in their names to the Secretary.

WAR SERVICE CHEVRONS MER-CANTILE MARINE.

spect of sea-going service, or cap-tivity or internment in an enemy country, during the period from the 4th of August, 1914, to 31st December, 1914.

2. One Chevron may be worn in respect of each or any of the three calendar years 1915, 1916 and 1917, provided that at least three months of the year have been spent affoat in sea-going service, or in captivity in an enemy country or both try or both.

3. One Chevron may be worn in re-spect of the remainder of the war. when twelve months have been spent since 1st January, 1918, in sea-going service (with or without a period of crotivity in ar enemy country), provided that the period of twelve months has commenced before 11th November, 1918, when the armistice was

The Chevrons for 1914 are:—
(1) For Captains and Officers,

silver.
(2) For men, red worsted.
The Chevrons for the other years, 1915-1918: (1) For Captains and Officers

gold.
(2) For men, blue worsted. The Chevron shall be similar to those worn in the Royal Navy and shall be worn on the forearm of the right sleeve or uniform, sea-rig or shore-rig. The silver and red worsted chevrons respectively shall be worn below the others.

6. No permission to wear the Chevrons other than this general authorization/will be required. Chevrons will not be provided by the Government, but they should be purchased by those authorised to wear them.

7. No unauthorised person may wear a Chevron.

NOTE.-Chevrons earned for Service in the Mercantile Marine in ac-cordance with this authorization may be worn on Naval and Military uni-form; when worn on Military uni-form the Chevrons should be of the pattern. By authority,
