Germany Will Refuse Demand of Entente.

League of Nations Publishes Text of Mandates--General Wood Exchanges Sword for Gown--United States Launch Two Superdreadnaughts--North German Lloyd Line Double Capitalization.

GERMANY DEFIANT.
BERLIN, March 22. Germany's reply to the demands of the Entente for payment before March 23rd of one billion marks gold to apply on the reparations obligations, will be in the negative, it was unofficially stated today.

APPEAL TO HARDING.
LONDON, March 22. The Russian Soviet government has appealed to President Harding and the United States Government to resume trade relations with Russia, says a wireless message from Moscow today. The Soviet Government proposed to send a delegation to the United States to negotiate an agreement, the message adds.

MURDER SUSPECTS UNDER ARREST.
NEW ORLEANS, March 22. Five men, said to be wanted in connection with the Wall Street bomb explosion of last year, were brought here today from Rio de Janeiro on the Shipping Board steamer Rushville. The men are sailors and give their nationality as German or Russian. They are shackled hand and foot. The five captured men were arrested late in February on the Shipping Board vessel City of Alton, where they were working as members of the crew. According to Captain B. B. Van Weelden, of the Rushville, under charter to the New York and Cuba Mail Line, a terrific fight ensued on the City of Alton when word was received by wireless from the United States authorities as to the identity of the men, accompanied by instructions for their arrest. They were finally overpowered, shackled and a strong guard placed over them.

A DAY'S CASUALTIES.
DUBLIN, March 22. Two policemen were killed and five wounded in an ambush in Keadow, County Roscommon, today. A bomb was thrown in the Dunrum residential suburb of Dublin last evening wounding two constables. Two men were shot dead, three houses burned

and several wrecked during a general Sinn Fein attack in Rossett, County Fermanagh, according to official figures received here today.

TEXTS OF MANDATES ISSUED.
LONDON, March 22. The League of Nations today issued the text of mandates for the administration of Samoa by New Zealand; of Nauru, or Pleasant Island, in the Pacific, a short distance south of the equator, by Great Britain; of German Southwest Africa by the Union of South Africa; and of former German possessions in the Pacific south of the equator, other than Samoa and Nauru, by Australia, in accordance with the terms of these mandates. The terms provide for the promotion of the material and moral well being of the inhabitants of the territories, the prohibition of slave trading and the prohibition of forced labor, except for essential public works, for which adequate remuneration is to be paid. Traffic in arms and ammunition is to be controlled. The supplying of intoxicating spirits and beverages to natives is prohibited. Military training of natives is prohibited, except for police and local defence. No military or naval bases shall be established or fortifications erected. Free exercise of all forms of worship shall be allowed and missionaries and nationals of states members of the League of Nations shall be permitted to travel and reside in territories and follow their callings.

MACKEREL FISHERS TO MAKE EARLY START.
BOSTON, March 22. Mackerel fishermen are to make an early start for the southern fishing grounds. The Halena, now being fitted at Gloucester, will get away ten days ahead of the usual time. Capt. John Matheson said today. A score of other vessels are preparing to follow shortly.

WILL ACCEPT LOWER WAGES.
NEW YORK, March 22. All marine workers employed on floating equipment in New York har-

bor by the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad have agreed to accept a reduction in wages, Henry Joyce, Chairman of the Marine Department of the General Managers' Association, announced today.

GENERAL WOOD RESIGNS.
WASHINGTON, March 22. Major-General Wood will retire from active service in the United States army to become head of the Pennsylvania University after he returns from Philadelphia. It was announced today at the War Department.

C. P. R. SHOPS SHUT DOWN.
MONTREAL, March 22. Five thousand men will be affected by the closing of the C.P.R. shops here from March twenty-third till April fourth. Slackness in orders is the excuse for the shut down.

THE ANGLORUSSIAN AGREEMENT.
LONDON, March 22. The Anglo-Russian agreement carried through by Lloyd George and Sir Robert Stevenson Horne in face of determined opposition, is generally regarded as more important from its political, than its economic implications, inasmuch as although it does not recognize the Soviet Government in the regular diplomatic sense, it is nevertheless tantamount to recognition of the de facto government and is most likely, according to well-informed circles, to be followed in no distant future by the regular political treaty.

ARRESTS IN SPAIN.
BARCELONA, March 22. Police have arrested an anarchist named Domenichen, on suspicion of implication in the assassination of Premier Dato. A prominent syndicalist has also been arrested.

IN SILESIA.
OPPEL, March 22. Disorders are reported at Suthen, where the closeness of the plebiscite vote has led to discord. In districts where the vote was decisive on either side all is quiet.

DREADNAUGHTS LAUNCHED.
CAMDEN, N.J., March 22. The superdreadnaughts Colorado and Maryland, ranking as the most powerful of the United States fleet, were launched here today.

COLORLESS COMMENT.
LONDON, March 22. Editorial comment in the morning papers on the succession of Austen Chamberlain to the leadership of the Unionist Party in the House of Commons is rather colorless.

FLU EPIDEMIC.
COBLENZ, March 22. Influenza in epidemic form has broken out here among soldiers belonging to the United States occupational army.

INCREASING CAPITAL.
WASHINGTON, March 22. Capitalization of the North German Lloyds Company has been increased from one hundred and twenty-five million marks to two hundred and fifty million marks, according to a report of the United States Department of Commerce. Construction of ships and development of service are expected to be carried out by the increases.

ACCEPTS COUNCIL OF NATIONS PLAN.
WARSAW, March 22. The Polish Government has accepted the plan of the Council of the League of Nations for mediation of the dispute with Lithuania arising from the occupation of Vilna by General Zeligonski and is ready to send a representative to Brussels to begin negotiations.

RESIGNS AS CHANCELLOR OF EXCHEQUER.
LONDON, March 22. Austen Chamberlain, who yesterday was elected leader of the House of Commons, announced today he was giving up his post as Chancellor of the Exchequer. He did not indicate the identity of his successor.

TAILORS GO ON STRIKE.
NEW YORK, March 22. Several thousand union tailors went on strike here today to retain a minimum wage of forty dollars a week and week work system.

BOLSHEVIKS IN BATUM.
CONSTANTINOPLE, March 22. Russian Bolshevik forces have occupied the city of Batum.

REPARATIONS BILL PASSES.
LONDON, March 22. The German Reparations Bill today passed all the remaining stages in the House of Lords, without discussion. The measure now needs only the King's assent to become law.

DECLINES TO ACCEPT RESIGNATION.
NEW YORK, March 22. James Selman, a prominent citizen and President of the National City Bank, whose divorce suit recently has attracted public attention, offered his resignation to the directors today, but the Board unanimously declined to accept it.

AN UNWISE SCHEME.
LONDON, March 22. H. Thomas, President of the Railwaymen's Union, introduced into the House of Commons today a bill for

LONDON, March 22. Australian Soldiers' Council has urged Premier Hughes to take a leading part in the Imperial Conference next year in order to ensure that Australia shall share the direction of foreign policy while securing a united empire for defence.

BOLSHEVIK ATTEMPTS FAIL.
NEW YORK, March 22. Attempts by Bolsheviks to recapture Erivan and other parts of Armenia from which they were driven have failed, according to a radio message received here today by the Near East Relief Committee. All of Armenia, it was stated, except the districts of Dellián and Nakhichevan has been cleared of Russian troops.

Clear Away the Wreckage.

CAPTAIN WHITELEY'S ADVICE.
"Clear away the wreckage and prepare at once to recover our markets lost through the Fishery Regulations," is the advice given by Capt. George Whiteley, who returned by last Kyle from a trip to Europe. "We must forget our monetary losses and by good business management make a supreme effort to regain the former favorable position which Newfoundland held in the fish markets of the world," he further added when interviewed by a Telegram reporter yesterday. Asked what he thought of the chances for the disposal of the balance of our codfish, he replied, "the market has struck bottom as far as the price is concerned. There is some movement of fish in Oporto, but the conditions in Spain are very bad due to flooding while we were fighting the Italian buyers. London brokers are looking for a little general improvement in the near future."

Capt. Whiteley did not think much good could be gained by a discussion of the harm done by the Regulations. He, however, stated that everywhere he went, our Fishery Regulations were looked upon as a most foolish piece of legislation. "In fact, we are the laughing stock of Europe," he said. Everywhere he was confronted with the query, "Did you think that Newfoundland was the only country that caught fish?" Questioned as regards the coming fishery, Captain Whiteley said, "We must have absolute assurances that the Regulations will not be again imposed; without this assurance no person will engage in the industry."

"Is there a possibility that they would be again imposed?" we asked. "Yes," he replied; "for having a large stock of old fish on hand, it is possible that regulations would be enforced conditioning the sale of this fish first. The consequent result would be that all new fish would be withheld from market giving our competitors again the advantage." Regarding outfitting, Capt. Whiteley said that prices must come down to enable us to produce cheaper fish. "There will be smaller crews and smaller outfits, of necessity, and the majority of fishermen this year will be sharemen, as it is felt that they should be prepared to take a portion of the risks as well as the outfitting. The fishery regulations must be repealed as a first step before any sane person will engage in next year's fishery," said the captain in conclusion.

Deputy Mayor Acknowledges Letter.

[Copy] City Hall, March 22, 1921. C. H. Hutchings, Esq., K.C., Inspector General Constabulary. Dear Sir--Your letter to Mayor Gosling, dated the 21st inst., in reference to the Palace fire, has been handed to me as Presiding Officer in the absence of Mr. Gosling. I have no intention of entering upon any discussion as to the merits or demerits of the case, but I cannot let the occasion pass without expressing my regret that you should have seen fit to continue and publish correspondence in the known absence of the addressee and apparently with the sole purpose of indulging in baseless and insulting criticism.

After close association with Mayor Gosling in Municipal management for the past six years, I have had opportunities of witnessing the ability and integrity with which he has handled civic problems, and knowing as I do the benefits derived by the city during his term of office, I must strongly resent the offensive nature of your letter. Already there has been too much printer's ink wasted in futile discussion. In many minds there are many opinions and you and the Mayor might be writing till Tibb's Eve without result.

I am in entire accord with the appointment of a Commission to enquire into all the circumstances of the fire, because I feel that the matter is too serious and of too great moment to end up with the usual editorial dictum "this correspondence must now cease."

I might say that I am writing this letter without the knowledge or approval of the Municipal Board, as I feel that I should lose no time in standing up for Mayor Gosling when you bring in the realms of argument the despicable weapon of abuse.
