Bankrupting A Community.

The attempt being made in certain quarters to-day, to defend the infamous Fishery Export Regulations, and the ridiculous claim that is being asserted that but for their abrogation, the price of fish would be higher than the ruling market rate, is part of a policy of bluff, having for its object the hoodwinking of the northern fishermen. It is not yet a year ago when the tollers from Bonavista and other northern Bays were driven to the extremity of holding an indignation meeting in the city, in order to champion their own cause and get a living rate for their products. At that time the Fishery Regulations were in full swing and had all the force and effect of law. Their progenitor was boasting of their value—as he is to-day—but yet the men who caught the fish could not secure the price necessary to bring them out square with their supply accounts. Hence they arose in their might, called a meeting, and passed certain resolutions, the text of which is still on record. In a word they compelled or frightened into acquiescence with their desires the great big man who said that "the price of fish was what he made it." Well, it's up to him now. Raving against those who opposed the Regulations, will not put ten cents additional on a quintal of fish. The boast that the price is what he makes it can better be made good by giving the maximum price, and thus by fair competition forcing all others in the purchasing market to do likewise. Practice before precept is advice usually followed, and in order to live up to preached principles let the present opportunity be seized upon. The true test is in sight and power. Let the man who boasts of his ability to make the price of fish get busy and prove his sincerity. So much for the North. The West is in a condition far worse than at any time in the history of responsible government. Small men have been swallowed up in the financial morass which engulfed large concerns, because their legitimate business was interfered with and their right of trade strangled by the imposition of the Fishery Regulations. Trading houses that had been landmarks for years went down with a crash, riven to their foundations by the operation of the Fishery Regulations, as interpreted by the Department of Marine and Fisheries and the head thereof. From being prosperous and progressive, parts of the South West Coast have received such a set-back as will take the people years to overcome. As a community they are bankrupt, the Fish Regulations being primarily responsible. Hard and incessant toil will alone bring about the restoration of former prosperity, but while the process is developing, people must suffer. There is no help for that now. It is inevitable, but had the Fish Regulations never been heard of there would be wealth to-day

where only privation exists. The West Coast can tell its own story. Let no man be deceived by the fairy pictures and tales of the solitary organ of the Coaker wing of the Government.

Bells!

To-night there will be bells galore. In the procession will be "Big Ben." Everyone will be armed with bells of some kind or other, hand bells, dinner bells, school bells, church bells, horse bells, sleigh bells. The spoony kind will have their bells. It does not matter so long as every body is happy and it to-night any are not happy they deserve all they get.

Bail Allowed.

Bail in personal bonds of \$2000 each and sureties of \$1000 was allowed the three members of the crew of the schooner "Romeo" charged with the larceny of goods from their ship. The Captain of the vessel who is under arrest at Bonavista, also desires bail, but he will have to come to town before bondsman can be found for him. Mr. G. W. B. Ayre is representing the accused.

Milk Case Heard.

The much postponed case of a milkman charged with a breach of the Pure Food Act was heard before Judge Morris this morning. Mr. C. J. Fox appeared for the accused, and Mr. E. Leo Carter prosecuted. Evidence of analysis was given by Mr. D. J. Davies and Health Inspector Lawlor also gave evidence. The case is likely to prove a very interesting one.

A Sanguinary Struggle.

An outbreak of hostilities to which the Thermopylae or the Charge of the Light Brigade were mere child's play, occurred recently at Fox Trap when a resident of that place stood up to six of his fellowmen and left his mark on them before he went under. The cause of the combat is unknown, but at least, we know that the spirit with which the gallant Horatius Coclus was imbued, still lives. Several witnesses have been subpoenaed and an interesting police court case will result. Mr. G. W. B. Ayre is acting for the plaintiff.

When crossing Placentia Bay on her way down, two weeks ago, the Dove had a very unpleasant time, a heavy sea boarding her and carrying away the deck load and shifting all her movable, including the ship's boat, on the deck. One member of the crew was washed overboard but luckily held on to a rope by which he was hauled back on the vessel. Temporary repairs were effected at H. Buffett on the way to this port.

SALUTING TRAGEDY.

LISBON, Oct. 24. When the British cruiser Calypso was entering port yesterday, a gun in the fortress firing a salute exploded killing one soldier and injuring three others. British, French and Spanish warships are lying in the Tagus, but order had been restored before their arrival.

NO INTEREST IN PACIFIC. PRETORIA, Oct. 24. South Africa has no direct interest in the Pacific, and did not look for an invitation to the Washington conference, Premier Smuts said to-day.

ABSOLUTELY OPPOSED. PRAGUE, Oct. 24. Czechoslovakia is considered to be committed to the policy of absolute opposition to the return of Charles, Premier Benes having recently declared that the restoration of the Hapsburgs would amount to "a casus belli."

AS USUAL. LONDON, Oct. 24. Unverified reports that former Emperor Charles of Austria has been assassinated, has been received by the Exchange Telegraph Company.

THE TORCH AND THE POWDER KEG. PARIS, Oct. 24. Troops of former Emperor Charles are closing on Budapest without meeting much resistance, according to information reaching the Allied Supreme Council.

REPUTATION. LONDON, Oct. 24. An ultimatum has been sent to the Hungarian Government by Czechoslovakia giving the former 48 hours to secure the removal of former Emperor Charles from that country, it is said in a despatch from Vienna.

A CAUSE FOR WAR. LONDON, Oct. 24. It is reported in Vienna that the British High Commissioner there has declared the Entente will construe the continued presence of former Emperor Charles in Hungary as "a casus belli" says an Exchange Telegraph despatch from the Austrian capital to-day.

WILLARD WILL COME BACK. NEW YORK, Oct. 24. Joe Willard will attempt to regain the world's heavyweight championship from Jack Dempsey, at Jersey City, next July first, Tex Rickard said to-day.

Codfish Dressing Machines.

GIVEN THOROUGH TEST.

Tests of the best-type "Iron Splitter" or cod fish dressing machine were completed at Gloucester during September and E. H. Waugh, chief engineer of the Smith Cannery Machines Company and designer has taken it to Europe for demonstrations in Great Britain and Norway. Brian Dunfield, representative of Job Brothers and Company, Ltd., of Newfoundland, the foreign agents for the machine accompanied Mr. Waugh on this trip.

Two of the splitters, shore-type machines, have been operated by Job Brothers this season, one at Blanc Sablon, Labrador and the other at St. John's Newfoundland.

At Blanc Sablon the work was under direction of Mr. Waugh who went to the Labrador coast in June and remained until August 1st. The entire season's catch of 200,000 cod fish of E. G. Grant were run through the splitter, for the most part within two hours after the fish were landed.

The splitter used at St. John's was used most of the season on haddock and is still in operation.

Regular employees of Job Brothers and Company became very proficient in handling the machine say that the fish are more uniform than it was possible to obtain under the hand method. The fish went through the machine and were dressed and split in about one tenth the time formerly required, all bones were removed, the fish washed and delivered ready for sale.

The best-type machine is of smaller size and was tried out at the plant of Gorton Pew Company. Those who witnessed its operation proclaimed it a remarkable demonstration of mechanical skill. With such a machine on a bank vessel, less men are required and six dories can do the work which would otherwise require ten.

John Wallace, president of the Smith Cannery Machines Company came East in July, visited Labrador, St. John's and Gloucester, being present at each place during the time when tests were under way. He was in New York early in September, then went to Washington, D.C., and returned to his home in Seattle, Washington, later in the month.—N. Y. Fishing Gazette.
