**Moorish Beliefs.**

Superstitions Have a Marked Effect  
on Their Customs.

One of the first things a traveler  
notices in a Moorish town are the  
"hands," painted or drawn, on the  
walls of many houses and buildings.  
These are to avert the "evil spirit";  
five, the number of fingers, is considered  
a sacred number. These hands  
are also worn in the form of ornaments,  
and serve to keep off the "evil  
eye." As in Europe and America, the  
horoscope is regarded as a sign of  
luck and is frequently seen over doorways.

A Moor considers it a great sin to  
cut bread with a knife, declaring that  
our hands were given us to break it.  
The same idea accounts for the saying  
that "to tread on corn is to tread  
on angels."

Offerings of food, hair, and other  
small articles are often placed in the  
trunks of certain trees, and have a  
great significance. As the makers of  
these offerings are poor Moors with  
large families, they firmly believe  
that Allah will be pleased and will  
give them means to support their  
family. Some Moors declare that after  
this offering their children eat  
less, and therefore, cost less to keep.

At another religious celebration  
spiked balls are thrown into the air  
and allowed to fall on the throwers'  
heads. The man who appears the  
most injured and ferocious is considered  
the most truly religious.

Moorish marriages are performed  
at midnight, and the bride is confined  
to her room for several days after  
the ceremony. No Moorish woman  
who is truly religious is seen in the  
streets at any time, except in cases of  
absolute necessity. Life is indeed different  
from that in Canada!

**The Queen Bans  
Plumage.**

Orders recently given by Queen  
Mary to her milliners that no plumage  
of wild birds should be used for any  
of her hats, cannot fail to exercise a  
far-reaching influence, says a special  
dispatch to the Philadelphia Evening  
Bulletin.

For the edict means the Queen has  
joined in the crusade against the destruction  
of the most beautiful of the  
wild feathered tribes, and from henceforth  
headgear, the plumage of which  
indicates it has cost the life of one or  
more wild birds, will be subject to the  
ban of the Court of St. James.

Queen Mary is already assured of  
the support of her mother-in-law,  
Queen Alexandra, who is never seen  
with a feather toque, and through  
whose influence during the reign of  
her husband, Edward VII., the wearing  
of egret's feather was virtually  
put out of fashion in Great Britain.

Nowhere will this decree of Queen  
Mary be received with more sympathy  
than in India, where the natives have  
always regarded the use of birds'  
feathers for adornment as a form of  
revolting barbarism, and as offensive  
to all their religious prejudices.

**Household Notes.**

An easy way to make a narrow  
string belt is to sew a string on the  
end and keep inside the belt while  
stitching. When you reach the other  
end pull the string and the belt is  
right side out.

A crisp salad of hearts of lettuce  
seems quite "dressed up" when served  
with Thousand Island dressing  
to which chopped olives and pickles  
and a little tomato flavoring have  
been added.

Delicious chicken croquettes are  
made by mixing together 1 cup corn  
meal mush, 1 cup chopped chicken,  
few drops onion sauce, 1 egg, salt and

pepper. Form into cakes and saute  
in a frying pan.

It is a good idea to go over the gas  
range after each meal with a dish mop  
slightly wet with kerosene. This  
keeps the range in spotless condition  
and makes frequent thorough cleanings  
unnecessary.

Corncrust fishballs: Soak one cup  
shredded codfish in warm water and  
season salt is removed. Shred, and  
add 2 cups corncrust mush, then add

1 egg well beaten, and a teaspoon butter.  
Form into balls and fry in deep fat.

Leather upholstered furniture should  
be carefully wiped with oil, about  
four times a year. Use a light oil,  
such as linseed, and apply only a small  
quantity. Wipe well, as any excess  
oil will catch the dust and darken the  
leather.

Tomato bisque: Heat separately 1  
can tomato soup and 2 cups milk.

when soup boils take from fire and add  
a pinch of soda. Add the hot milk,  
and just before serving add 1 teaspoon  
butter and a little minced parsley.  
serve.

An excellent rule for cocoa, which  
makes six cups, is to mix 3 tablespoons  
cocoa, with 2 tablespoons sugar, a  
pinch of salt and one of cinnamon;  
add this to one cup boiling water and

boil three minutes. Have a  
scalded in double boiler and  
the cocoa mixture; heat  
serve.
