Empire Day was fittingly celebrated by the C.L.B. Cadets at Bay Roberts, as the Rev. E. M. Bishop, Major John Dawe, O.C., arranged for the annual inspection on Saturday, May 24th. Lt.-Col. F. Rendell, C.B.E., Officer-in-Charge, 1st Ndd. Regiment C.L.B. was inspection officer, with Major John Dawe, O.C., as Chief of Staff. These officers went to Bay Roberts specially for the duty on Saturday morning and were the guests of Major John and Mrs. Dawe, Bay Roberts. H. Company was organized in 1913, and is now eleven years old, yearly gaining in usefulness and efficiency as one of the bright spots in the parish organization as a means of moral and physical training. The inspection took place at 3 p.m., at the headquarters in the large store building placed at their disposal by the Major Dawe's firm. The presence of N.C.O.'s and Quartermaster special rooms fitted up for their respective use.

The following officers were on duty, Major John Dawe, Officers Commanding, Captain N. French, Adjutant, Lieut. Charles Butt, R. J. Mercer, Lieut. Reuben Parsons and Sergt. Major Smith. Mercer has been awarded a ten year good conduct long service medal which will be officially presented in a few days. A brass band of twelve instruments under Bandmaster Smith, doing good work. Weekly parades are held regularly. After the inspection on the parade grounds opposite the rectory, by the Lieut.-Col. Rendell, the company marched back to their headquarters where Lieut.-Col. Rendell addressed the parade and extended his congratulations on their progress and efficiency. He also gave them good sound advice on discipline and loyalty which was keenly received. His address was followed by the Brigade Major Williams, who spoke of his visit two years ago to the company and who was pleased to see the Bay Roberts Company carrying on well and making increased progress on Brigade duty. He called upon the silver cup of 1922, as the lad who had won the most points in the year and personally congratulated him on his success. The Brigade Major offered another silver cup as a trophy for competition in attendance, good conduct, and payment of dues—to be presented at Christmas. The Brigade offered several selections and the company concluded with the National Anthem.

Bay Roberts C.L.B. Ladies' Auxiliary are enthusiastic workers. Seven only in number their quality is up for quantity. Under the leadership of Mrs. E. M. Bishop, Mrs. John Dawe, Vice-President and Mrs. Noel Butt, Secy.-Treasurer of members, this Auxiliary has been working for the finance of the company. 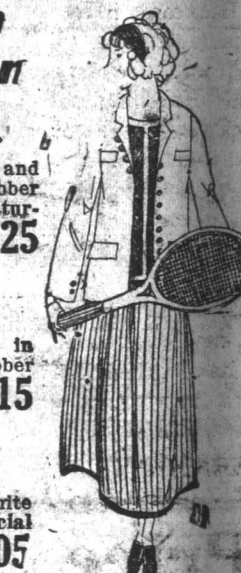
