

Appalling Total Has Aroused Public Sentiment-Court

In New York There Were 119 Murders Last Year-In London Total Was 19

N EW YORK, Sept. 12.—Recent crimes of violence, including the conspiracy resulting in Herman Rosenthal's death and the atroctous murders of two little girls, Julia Commors and Mary Barbuto, have aroused the American Prison Association, which is preparing pronouncement against the "In New York city last year there

"In New York city last year there were 119 cases of homicide, while in London, with a far greater population, there were only mineteen," says Judge De Courcey, of the Supreme Court of Massachusetts, who is chairman of the American Prison Assachathon's Committee on Criminal sociation's Committee on Criminal Procedure. Then he adds: "In the United States punishment for crime is slow and uncertain; in England it is swift and certain." These recent crimes in New York

city, which have stirred the country tion, advance sheets of which indi-cate that criminal procedure in the courts is to blame for the prevalence Blame Laid to Courts

"Then thousand homicide crimes are committed in the United States each year," says the head of the New York State Reformatory, at Elmira, who is a leading criminologist active in the Prison Association. "One

who is a leading criminologist active in the Prison Association. "One hundred and eighteen homicide crimes were committed for the same time in London, and London is four times the size of Chicago.

"Homicidal crime in the United States has increased 450 per cent. since 1889. Thereof, the ratio of convictions is less than ten per cent. The same ratio for Germany is ninety-five per cent. Homicidal crime in the United States exceeds the total of any ten civilized nations outside of Russia."
