THIS DAY IN HISTORY.

September 9.

1306—Battle of Poitiers; Edward, the Black Prince, with 8,000 men, defeated 60,000 French.

1219—Battle of Flodden; James IV of Scotland, 30 of his nobles and 10,000 of his men were slain.

1708—Charles de St. Evremont, famous wit and letter writer, died in London.

1801—Rev. Gilbert Wakefield, English political and theological writer, died.

1822—Prince Napoleon Bonaparte, son of Jerome, died.

1850—President Fillmore signed the act admitting California as a state.

1870—Rev. Dr. Nathan Lord, president of Dartmouth college, died at Hanover, N.H., aged 77.

1880—Henry Parry Liddon, canon of St. Paul's cathedral, London, died, aged 61. New Zealand voted against entering into a federation of the Australian colonies.

—The classes in the Collegiate Institute will convene on Monday morning.

—Ground is being broken over the Kensington bridge for London West's electric railway.

—Miss C. Westland has returned from a two weeks' visit with Sarnia and Wyoming relatives.

—The Bishop of Huron will administer the rite of confirmation in Trinity Church, Watford, Oct. 10.

—No. 8 committee held an informal meeting last evening to look over the specifications of the proposed city electric light plant.

—President Cleveland yesterday sent to the Senate the nomination of George J. Wilcox, Georgia, as consul at Port Stanley and St. Thomas, Canada.

—All parties wishing badges and regalia are requested to note the change of address of the Gardner Regalia Company, to 240 Dundas street, upstairs, over J.B. Murphy's grocery store.

—The memorial service of the late John Beattie, who was for years a prominent member of St. James' Church, South London, will be conducted by the Dean of Huron to-morrow.

—Wm. Wanless, assistant burser at the London Asylum, is the guest of his brother-in-law, Thos. Ewart, second line west of Wyoming. Mr. Wanless was one of the pioneer merchants of Sarnia, having settled there in 1856.—(Examiner Press.)

—A Montreal dispatch says: "Sir Henry Tyler, president of the G. T. R., accompanied by Messrs. Sergeant, Wainwright, Stevenson, Hannaford, Wallis and Lanning have returned to the city from an inspection tour of the eastern division of the road. The inspection of the western division early next week."

—A meeting was held in Croyne Hall yesterday afternoon in connection with the Women's Auxiliary Missionary Association. The Bishop of Huron occupied the chair, and there was a good attendance.

—Mr. Macintosh, a missionary from the Northwest Territories, delivered an interesting address on the work among the Indians.

—In Thursday's Police Court report, with reference to the charge of drunkenness against Mrs. Watson and the family complication a mistake occurred in stating that Mr. Watson was found guilty of being drunk. It was Mrs. Watson who was so found guilty, and she was released on suspended sentence. The error arose through a slip of the types.

—The entertainment committee of Court Forest Queen, A. O. F., held their first meeting of the season last evening and elected the following officers: William Long, chairman; E. L. Fysh, treasurer; Ed. Wilkins, secretary. It was decided to commence the winter's entertainment by a grand concert and assembly, to be held in the city hall on Thanksgiving night. Sub-committees were appointed to engage a first-class quartet band, and also the best concert talent procurable.

—At a meeting of the Western Fair directors yesterday it was decided that the entries in all classes, except an exception would be left open until the evening of Sept. 14.

—Typhoid Fever at the Hospital.

The Hospital Trust met at the City Hospital yesterday afternoon. Present: R. Lewis (chairman), C. F. Compain, Jas. Gilmour and Medical Superintendent's report showed an unprecedented number for this time of the year. There were fifteen cases of typhoid fever. The following were present: Dr. E. L. Fysh, Miss Milne, a probationer, was placed on the regular staff of nurses. Applications to become nurses were received from Edith E. Rigby, city; Jean Baptiste, Assiniboia; Jennie Allister, city. Accounts to the amount of \$679.20 were passed. Collections for the month of August, \$538.60. The superintendent was granted the remainder of this month for holidays.

—A London Boy Banqueted.

"A Petrolia dispatch says: A grand complimentary banquet, at which Mayor Summons presided, was tendered by the young gentlemen of Petrolia to Mr. Ernie Fitzgerald, son of Mr. F. A. Fitzgerald, of London, at the Anderson House to-night, the occasion being his farewell to bachelorhood. The dining hall was decorated with bunting, and a spread of all the delicacies of the season comprised the menu, while the after-programme of toasts, music, recitations and speeches was of an unusually high character. Among the speakers were the mayor, Mr. Geo. Sanson, Mr. F. A. Fitzgerald, Mr. W. H. Hamond, Mr. Ernie Fitzgerald, representatives of the press and others. money drawer had been burst open and the contents taken. A 5-cent piece was found on the floor. —DROPPED DEAD.

Thomas Horton Goes for His Evening's Milk

And Dies While Waiting for It—A Cancer the Cause—No Inquest.

He went across the way for the milk for his evening's tea, dropped dead as he reached his destination and the body was brought home by his eldest son a few minutes afterwards.

Such was the sad and sudden death last evening of Thomas Horton, an old soldier, who for many years has resided on Ontario street, in the East End. Mr. Horton had been troubled with a cancer on the tongue, and a couple of months ago he underwent an operation at the City Hospital, when the greater portion of his tongue was removed. He was discharged shortly afterwards, but the disease shortly reappeared at the junction of the tongue and the throat. It was the choking caused by this cancer that caused death, and when Dr. Gardner drove up he was not surprised. In fact he had been expecting it for some time. No inquest was therefore considered necessary.

The dead man had been in the habit of crossing over to a neighbor, Mrs. Bloomer, on Dufferin avenue, to get his supply of milk, and last evening he took up his tin pail and set out as usual. The cow was not home and Mr. Horton was asked to sit down for a few minutes. He sat down in the open air, and in a few minutes Mrs. Bloomer arrived and started by the cry of Mr. Horton was lying on the grass. Such was found to be the case. Death indeed came so suddenly that all was quiet when the doctor and the dead man's son were sent for. The latter drove up to the scene first, and the body was tenderly lifted by neighbors, who had congregated around, and placed in the vehicle and then borne home.

Mr. Horton was an Englishman, a pensioner, and had resided in the city for upwards of 25 years. He was about 60 years old. Two sons and two daughters survive him. They are Mrs. John Atkinson, Grey street, Sarah, Joshua and Ned.

LAURIER AT THE FALLS.

The Guest of Mr. Lowell, M.P., Drummondville—Heartily Received.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Sept. 8.—Hon. Wilfrid Laurier arrived here last evening on the arrival of the return special train for Welland about 11 o'clock, and drove in company with Mr. James Lowell, M.P., to the residence of Mr. Lowell, where he was met by a large number of friends.

Mr. Laurier was in the beautiful little village of Drummondville. After his arrival there he retired and was up early this morning, and after eating a hearty breakfast and after seeing Mr. and Mrs. Lowell to all the points of interest on both sides of the river, spending a good deal of time in Queen Victoria Park. After luncheon he took the 3 p.m. Michigan Central train for St. Thomas. Several prominent Reformers called on Mr. Laurier to pay their respects to their great leader. His coming not being known few people were at the station when the train arrived outside of St. Thomas. The car those present gave him a hearty cheer.
