Against City Water Rates-& Fixed Charge Should be Made to Factories,

The water commissioners, at their regular meeting yesterday afternoon, were waited upon by a number of citizens, who protested against the charges for city water. Mr. C. J. Beal and Col. Lewis appeared in behalf of the trustee board of Dundas Street Center Methodist Church. Their case came up at the last meeting of the commissioners, and Engineer Moore reported that the average amount of water consumed during the last six months was 52,000 cubic feet, Mr. Beal held that the church was being taxed too much for their services. They had made previous payments under protest, claiming that the meter was not working properly. The commissioners had held then found it was all right, but now they had found from their own evidence that it was not working correctly. Chairman Cowan-What evidence is
