VAUDEVILLE LITIGATION

Local Interest in A. J. Small's Suit Against Manager Shea.

Manager Cairns, of the Grand, Speaks of the Local Aspect of the Situation.

The public of this city and of Hamilton and Ottawa, as well as theatrical men in general in Canada and the United States, are interested in the lawsuit which has been instituted by Mr. A. J. Small, of the Grand and Toronto Opera Houses, Toronto, and the Grand Opera House here, for \$7,500 damages against Shea's Yonge Street Theater Company, the claim arising out of the non-fulfillment of an agreement made between the plaintiff and defendant company, and the cancellation of a contract whereby the vaudmeeting will be on Nov. 26, and it is eville performances given at Shea's Toronto theater would be presented at the plaintiff's theaters in Ottawa, Hamilton and London.

So far as the public of this city are concerned, their sympathy will be entirely with Mr. Small in the matter. It will be remembered that the public were promised a high-class vaudeville bill weekly, throughout the season. The first one was put in on Sept. 30, and was a fairly good one, being accorded as much patronage as could be expected for such an innovation. The second show a week later, was considerably below the first in point of excellence, and far below the standard which vaudeville should maintain to It also was accorded quite as much business as it deserved. The public, however, were beginning to take to the vaudeville habit, and many were looking forward with interest to the third show, which included James J. Corbett, in his monologue turn, and a better supporting bill than had yet appeared. Practically without notice, At a meeting of the official board however, the attraction was cancelled, and it is only now that the public of this city learns that it was the fault of Mr. Shea, and not that of Mr. Small or the local management. Mr. Shea's faint-hearted withdrawal from his contract before the public had been given a fair chance to show their true attitude toward vaudeville is even less understandable after his expression of willingness to lose several thousand dollars in the venture of giving vaud-

Mr. J. F. Cairns, the manager of the Grand Opera House here, was seen by a reporter today and asked what he could say as to the local aspect of the case. Mr. Cairns replied: "London was not treated fairly in the matter of Shea's vaudeville. The people were just beginning to understand what the vaudeville really meant, when the shows were withdrawn. Everybody wanted to see Corbett, and we could have packed the house that week, when suddenly I received word that the vaudeville contract had been Grand Opera House here, was that the vaudeville contract had been broken by Mr. Shea. The whole thing put the local management in an awkward position. We had promised the public such headliners as Jessie Bartlett Davis, Eugene Cowles, James J. Corbett, and other leading vaudeville people, but as a matter of fact Lon-don was not given these or any other headliners, and so was given no chance to chow its appreciation. I myself did more to book the Shea show than any other attraction we had booked. The best people were beginning to realize that it was quite safe to come and see the Shea shows. London people had shown in their attendance at vaudeville shows at Springbank summer that they were prepared be generous in their patronage of the high-class article, and they should have been given a better chance prove it than they were given.'
