

ONLY GORILLA IN CAPTIVITY

An Interesting Visitor From South Africa.

RESCUED FROM A BIG PYTHON

The Animal Will Be Taught Music, Games, and to Eat in Regular Man Fashion.

New York, July 20.—There recently arrived in the United States and is now at Collingwood, O., near Cleveland, the only living gorilla in America. Americans who saw the famous orang-outang in New York, and Esau, the famous chimpanzee, both of whom are now dead, will be interested in learning of the new arrival. The same trainer, Capt. C. W. De Lancia, who exhibited the noted chimpanzee, and who was with him in London at the time of his death, is now in charge of what is believed to be the only gorilla in captivity.

The name of the new arrival is Orab. He is fourteen months old and the most amusing little fellow that could be imagined. If he can be induced to live he will be the smartest of the ape species that has ever been the subject of captivity and training. He will also prove a source of great interest and knowledge to the medical fraternity and to the evolutionists.

There are reasons why the little gorilla will eventually excel the chimpanzee. In the first place the gorilla is believed to be the highest type of anthropoid ape. The chimpanzee is next in point of intelligence, then comes the orang-outang. Darwin's studies were confined to the gorilla. When Orab is 20 months old Capt. De Lancia will begin to train him. With the experiences he has had with the chimpanzee he will know something of what the gorilla is capable of accomplishing. He will therefore first teach Orab the tricks for which Esau was famous, and then proceed much further. If Orab does what Esau did he will eat with a knife and fork instead of with his fingers. He will write his name in handwriting and also upon the typewriter. His musical feats will consist of playing the C chord upon the piano. He will also ride a bicycle, sharpen a lead pencil and pare his nails.

The story of the capture of Orab is one of the most interesting chapters in wild animal history. It occurred last January near Boma, in Central Western Africa. Capt. De Lancia is the foreign purchasing agent in Africa and India for Bostock, the noted animal man. He was on a tour after wild animals when the opportunity offered to secure this rare prize. He was accompanied by a number of natives. When Orab was discovered he was clinging to his mother's back and about the mother there was coiled a python, which it was afterward discovered, measured 25 feet in length. The mother gorilla stood near 6 feet tall.

The battle between the snake and the full-grown gorilla was a fierce one. In the gorilla's hand was a huge stick, which it was wielding with remarkable ability. It was found later that the snake had received wounds about the head at the point of contact. The snake would likely have resulted in its death even if the hunting party had not killed it. The gorilla, however, was nearly crushed to death by the python. Orab's first journey in captivity was from his native haunts in South Africa to Glasgow, Scotland. From there he was brought to Collingwood, Orab is at present being housed in a cage on the floor of which is about on a level with the heads of visitors. Beneath this glass house is a platform on which the gorilla sits. The temperature of his apartment is kept up to 90 degrees, and even this is not sufficient to keep him comfortable. The temperature is one of the most important precautions in the case of Orab. He is healthy. On the day that he sat for a photograph he was well blanketed before being taken out of his warm quarters, and the blankets were removed only while the exposure of the camera plate was being made. But even this was not sufficient. America gave him a slight cold and Capt. De Lancia gave him attention in order that no serious effects would result.

Of course, Orab is very young now and cannot stand the cold. He gets older. The gorilla does not attain its full growth until about 17 years of age. It then grows to a height of 6 feet 6 inches to 6 feet in height. The chimpanzee which died last winter had attained the age of 12 years, and weighed 56 pounds. In his wild state, he would have weighed more. Orab, if he lives to be 4 years old, will be much larger, however. He now weighs 20 pounds.

In the native land the gorilla, when seen at all, is usually carrying a stick over his shoulder and walking erect. This stick may consist of a branch of a tree. In addition to using this stick as a weapon in case of emergency the gorilla also uses it to knock down fruit from the trees.

Orab's attendants are a Kaffir woman and her little boy. The woman is from the same section of Africa from which the gorilla was brought. She belongs to a people who are dwarfs. Although full grown, she is but 3 feet high. Orab is very affectionate, and has already taken a great liking to the woman and little boy, as well as to Capt. De Lancia, who is to train him.

Orab is already showing a decided disposition to play and to mimic. He seems to take pride in his suit of clothes, and never looks happier than when he is seated in his chair. He has learned to take a sponge in his hand and wash the windows of his apartments, just as he has seen this work done.

SCHOONER WRECKED

A Lake Huron Gale Sinks the Franz Siegel.

Toledo, Ohio, July 20.—The schooner General Franz Siegel, laden with 50 tons of coal, going from Huron to Sandusky, went down off Monroe, Mich., Saturday morning, and is totally lost. There was a crew of five on board, and all were rescued by the United States survey boat, General Williams. The Siegel attempted to go through the severe storm raging on the lake Friday night, and, seeing that it would not be able to do so, attempted to get into the port at Monroe, when the boat went down in 20 feet of water. Capt. Curtis, of Beach Park, Ohio, was the owner and captain of the boat. The General Franz Siegel is one of the oldest boats on the lakes, having been built 40 years ago.

STRIKES AND PISTOLS

A Serious Labor Situation at Pittsburgh, Pa.

Pittsburgh, Pa., July 20.—Three mills of the Port Vue tin plate plant at Koppersburg, Pa., were closed Saturday. Manager Lauck has issued an ultimatum declaring the union will not be recognized unless the strikers sign a statement of no strike. The strikers, who are the Amalgamated Association, asserts that the strike will be fought to the bitter end. The workers have been provided with revolvers in anticipation of an attack by the strikers, and a later have been armed with shotguns and rifles leading to the works, but no conflict has occurred, although trouble is feared.

TO FIGHT A TRUST

'Longshoremen Have Important Convention at Bay City.

Bay City, Mich., July 20.—D. J. Keefe, of Chicago, and H. C. Barter were elected president and secretary respectively of the International Longshoremen, Marine and Transport Workers' Association, at the close of the twelfth annual convention of the association here Saturday. Among the vice-presidents are J. A. Laughton, of Sarnia, Ont., and L. Montmarquet, of Montreal. Milwaukee was chosen as the next place of meeting.

The declaration of First Vice-President Joyce in favor of discrimination against all vessel owners who are members of the Lake Carriers' Association, is generally regarded as the beginning of a fight against the so-called steel trust and Gilchrist fleet and several lines of vessels owned by railroads. The matter was referred to the executive council.

The conservative element rallied today to President Keefe's anti-sympathetic strike ideas, while the strikes were not abolished. Delegate Casey, of Buffalo, secured the passage of a resolution which would give a majority assent of all delegates to a wage conference before a sympathetic strike can be declared.

WHISTLER'S LAST MESSAGE

Ordered That No News of His Death Should Go Out.

London, July 20.—The last instructions given by James McNeill Whistler, the eminent American artist, prior to his death Friday, were quite characteristic of the man. When the Associated Press correspondent called at the house Saturday he was informed that the artist had left strict instructions that no information whatever regarding his illness or death should be given to the press.

It has been nearly a year since Dr. Whistler, who had been studying in the Rue du Bac, Paris, and came to live again in London. During the interval he had returned to Paris. He lived in an old house which he formerly occupied in Cheyne Walk, near the Thames and is overgrown with creepers. The studio is at the back of the house.

Whistler's friends could not imagine why he returned to London, as he disliked the place. His climate and his English art were his life. He returned to England, he said, because he was tired of Paris and his friends, but gradually led a more and more reclusive life. The exact nature of his complaint is not known. He grew rapidly worse a few days ago and died quite suddenly Friday.

KHEDIVE AS ENGINEER

Egypt's Ruler Proves to Be Daring and Fast Runner.

Paris, July 20.—It happens quite often that sovereign monarchs arrive here incognito, but the Khedive of Egypt has surpassed them all in this respect of incognito.

When he arrived here on a trip from London a few days ago his incognito was so perfect that he did not even recognize his own face when he looked into a mirror.

He came in on the regular express from Calais, but though the company had placed their private car at his disposal he never as much as looked at it, but insisted on making his trip on the locomotive.

At Calais he dressed himself up in overalls, an automobile cap, and having been initiated into the works of the mechanism of the engine, climbed up in the cab and took his seat at the throttle, and a minute later the train was slowly gathering speed.

Faster and faster it went, his Egyptian highness proved himself a most reckless engineer, he continually called to the fireman to throw more coal under the boiler, while the train was tearing along at a rate which broke all European records.

The train was 20 minutes late when it reached London, but arrived at Amiens fifteen minutes ahead.

In a tunnel his highness lost both his cap and his glasses, and when he arrived here he looked anything but royal, but his face was beaming with satisfaction as he handed the regular engineer and fireman a louis d'or and jumped back into a cab, the driver of which looked in astonishment on his blackened face and grimy clothes, but received a liberal fare in advance and drove off, not suspecting that he was driving for a man of the blood royal.

BURGLARS MET ON STAIRS

A Shooting Bee Commenced on Sighting Each Other.

St. Joseph, Mo., July 20.—The mystery of the shooting in the house of Enoch Scragge a week ago has been cleared up by a letter received by Chief of Police Franz. The letter is from a man who admits that he is a burglar and that he entered the Scragge home for the purpose of robbery.

"While coming down the stairway," the robber wrote, "I met a man starting up. I could see that he had a revolver in his hand and was ready to shoot. I fired at him and he fired at me. The same instant he fired at me, several shots were fired and I was hit in the shoulder. The other man was shot in the side."

"By that time the occupants of the house had been aroused, and I made my escape. I did not see him again. It was not serious enough to have a physician called, and I learned later that two or three days later I learned that a friend of mine, whom I had not seen for some time, had been shot in a house on Tenth street. I thought I recognized the man, and I believed the same man who had been shot in the newspaper account. I had read the newspaper account, and the facts dawned on me."

"The facts are that the other man was also in the house for the purpose of robbing it. I have seen him since, and we have compared our experience of the robbery. I did not know I was in the house at that time. I thought I was going to the place, and I believed the same man who had been shot in the newspaper account. 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OCCUPANTS OF PAPAL THRONE

Beggarman or Prince May Wear the Triple Crown.

THE SOCIAL SCALE IS IGNORED

Strange Contrasts Presented by Different Pontiffs—From Cave to Vatican.

Rome, July 20.—The democracy of the papacy is well illustrated in the antecedents and circumstances of those who have occupied the papal throne. It contains some strange contrasts.

Many of the successors of St. Peter have been descendants of princely and exalted families, as Leo XIII., while others have come from families whose position in the social scale was the reverse of high.

Sixtus IV., who was elected pope in 1484, was a pig driver at Montalto, when, under the name of Felix Perelli, he attracted the attention of a Franciscan monk who converted him. He rose to be Bishop of Fermo and then was elected pope.

Alexander VI., chosen in 1494, had been a beggar boy; Sixtus IV., 1471, was the son of a fisherman; Urban IV., 1281, was a shoemaker; and Gregory XVI., 1831, was a shepherd's son, and Boniface the Great had been a street arab and had even held the horses of the noble rich for pennies.

It was a man that when he was crowned as pope in recollection of early days, he had two kings lead him to the throne. Tradition declares that Victor I., an Ethiopian, and a colored man, three of the occupants of the Holy See, have been Jews, but the early days, before the lines of religious belief were so strictly drawn. These three were St. Peter, St. Clement and Theodosius I., who resigned in 62.

Several of the popes were laymen, and the election to the pontificate had been declined several times. Martin IV., six years old when he was elected, was a lawyer and he died on the way to Rome. Innocent VIII. was married and father of a large family. He did not take orders until after the death of his wife.

Adrian II. was elected three times, and declined twice. He was seventy-six years old when he was elected, and died at eighty-one. He was a married man and a cardinal deacon.

FROM CAVE TO VATICAN.
Benedict III. declined the papal chair because he was a hermit, abdicated in 1222 after five months in the Pontiff's seat. But he was not the youngest of the popes. Leo XIII. was elected at the age of 18 by the influence of King Otto, whom he crowned king of Italy. He lived a short time after and died suddenly.

Some authorities say he was assassinated, others that he was poisoned. He was only 37 years old at the time of his death. His successor, Leo VIII., was a layman, and ruled the church for only a few days.

Benedict IX., who occupied the papal throne from 1033 to 1045, was elected pope when he was only 12 years old, through the influence of his family, the Counts of Tusculum.

Pope Adrian IV., who reigned from 1154, was the only Englishman who ever wore the tiara, and a very remarkable man.

His name was Nicholas Breakspere; he was born at Abbots-Langley in Hertfordshire, was the son of a beggar, and during his childhood subsisted upon alms and begged upon the streets himself with his father and mother and other members of the family.
