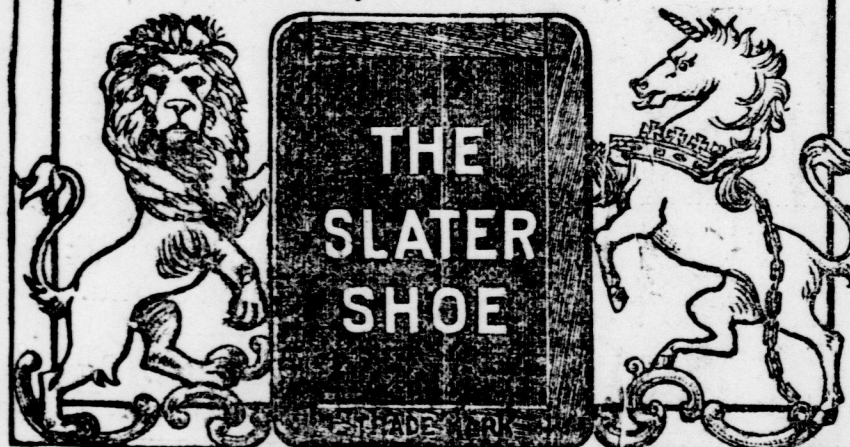

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

REPUBLICAN BY 25 MAJORITY

Gov. Odell's Plurality in New York 12,887.

TWO YEARS AGO IT WAS 111,000

Utah May Send a Mormon to the United States Senate—Some Official Figures.

New York, Nov. 5.—Mr. Coler, the Democratic opponent of Governor Odell, refused today to concede defeat, declaring that he wished to wait for the official count of the vote. Mr. Coler says: "Suppose the Democratic ticket had received, say, in the neighborhood of 150,000 majority in Greater New York, there was nothing to have stopped the Republicans from claiming the upper section of the state by at least 200,000."

This declaration by Mr. Coler was followed by an announcement from Secretary Mason, of the state Democratic committee, that he refused to concede Odell's election, and that he would not be a party to any plan of action.

The New York Evening Journal also issued an extra edition, declaring that ex-Senator Hill, Chas. F. Murphy and Hugh McLaughlin claimed Coler's election.

John A. Mason, secretary of the Democratic state committee, issued a statement, in which he said: "We concede nothing. Odell's election is simply a claim. We will not admit his election until every defective ballot has been scrutinized. We have evidence of wholesale debauchery, and corruption in Orange, Oneida, Albany and Erie Counties and in the cities along the line of the New York Central Railroad."

SENATOR PLATT'S VIEW.

Senator Thomas C. Platt, of the Republican "boss," issued a statement on the state election. He said: "We have to be satisfied. Odell's plurality is not nearly as large as I had expected." Senator Platt said that in his opinion the trust question and the coal strike had nothing to do with the result of the vote. "The Democrats got together," he said, "and a few Republicans slipped over to them."

A GREAT FLOP.

Since Roosevelt P. Flower, in a Democratic landslide, defeated J. Sloan Patterson for governor, in the face of Republican predictions of an easy victory, there has not been such an overturning of votes from the Republican to the Democratic party in this state as that which occurred yesterday. Except in Erie, Albany and Rensselaer Counties, every Democratic prediction of sweeping majorities came through. Especially was this so below the Bronx. The claim of 112,000 in the Greater New York for Odell, which was supposed by the Republicans to be greatly exaggerated, was more than verified, but the claims as to Erie, Albany and Rensselaer were not.

Erie, instead of giving a Democratic plurality of from 4,000 to 5,000, went for Odell by 560, a loss from the vote given Judge Van Hook in 1890 of 2,800 votes. Albany County, which gave Odell 4,000 plurality in a presidential year, beat its presidential year vote by 1,500. Rensselaer County gave a Republican plurality of nearly 2,000, when, because of local differences, a Republican loss was expected.

ODELL'S PLURALITY 12,887.

New York, Nov. 5.—Midnight official figures on the state election show very little from the unofficial reports. Returns to the executive at Albany by the several county clerks make the plurality for Odell, Republican, 12,887. Only three counties above the Bronx were carried by the Democratic nomination.

The State Legislature is controlled by the Republicans by a reduced majority, but one so large as to admit of no doubt of the return of Mr. Platt to the United States Senate. The New York delegation in the Lower House of the 58th Congress will number 37, Democrats, 17 and 20 Republicans. It will contain 20 Republicans and 17 Democrats, whereas the present delegation stood 22 Republicans and 12 Democrats. All of the more noted members of the delegation have been returned.

Over its combined vote in the state two years ago the Democratic party gained at least 35 per cent and the Republican party lost 40 per cent. From a plurality of 111,000 Odell drops to 12,887, a loss of nearly 100,000.

RESULTS IN OTHER STATES.

DELAWARE.

The State Senate will stand, 10 Republicans and 7 Democrats, house, 12 Republicans and 16 Democrats, with one district undecided. On joint ballot the vote will be 28 Republicans, 23 Democrats and 10.

IDaho.

A Republican majority on joint ballot seems assured. Democratic State Chairman Donnelly concedes the election of the entire Republican ticket, but claims that the Republicans will have one less

than a majority on joint ballot in the Legislature. Republican leaders claim their majority will be 12.

MASSACHUSETTS.

The State of Massachusetts chose a Republican ticket, congressional delegation of ten Republicans and four Democrats, a state senate of 31 Republicans and 19 Democrats, and a House of Representatives of 153 Republicans, 52 Democrats and 3 Socialists.

MICHIGAN.

Governor Bliss was re-elected by about 40,000 plurality, as against 78,284 two years ago. Alfred Lucking, of Detroit, defeated J. E. Corlies for first district in Congress by between 2,000 and 3,000—the only Democrat elected in Michigan. The other Congressmen elected are: Second district, Charles E. Townsend; third district, Washington Gardner; fourth district, E. L. Hamilton; fifth district, William A. Smith; sixth district, Samuel W. Smith; seventh district, Henry McMorris; eighth district, W. Fordney; ninth district, R. P. Bishop; tenth district, George A. Loud; eleventh district, B. Darragh; twelfth district, H. O. Young. W. C. Maybury was re-elected mayor of Detroit over Dr. Carstairs by nearly 3,000 majority.

NEBRASKA.

Returns received at Republican state headquarters show that the Republicans have elected 5 of the 6 Congressmen in Congress by between 2,000 and 3,000. The sixth district, in which Omaha is situated is the only one carried by the Fusionists. It is now almost certain that Mickey, Republican, is elected governor by about 2,000. The next Legislature will be strongly Republican.

PENNSYLVANIA.

Incomplete returns indicate Pennsylvania's delegation in the next Congress will stand: Republicans 23, Democrats 4.

RHODE ISLAND.

The Democrats elected their candidate for governor, Lieutenant Governor. The Democratic party made gains throughout the entire state, electing mayors in four of the five cities. The United States senator, Republican lead in the House of Representatives. The Senate remains strongly Republican.

UTAH.

Unofficial returns from practically every section show that the Republicans have made almost a clean sweep of the state. The Legislature, which every Democrat predicted would be a Republican, will be Republican.

WASHINGTON.

The Democrats concede the election of the three Congressmen at large. The Republicans will have a majority of 30 on joint ballot in the Legislature.

COMPLEXION OF CONGRESS.

REPUBLICAN BY 25 MAJORITY.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 5.—The latest returns received up to 10:30 tonight show that the Republicans (including in this description the Fusionists) elected 25 of the 53 Congressmen at large, and the Democrats 28. The fusionists carried the next house by a vote of 204 Republicans to 179 Democrats, in the district, the eighth Tennessee and California districts, remaining so much in doubt that the official returns will be needed to decide the result. The totals given are believed to be correct, although there are a few districts, such as two in Colorado and one in Minnesota, where the Republican and Democratic party managers respectively do not concede defeat, but the general result could not be affected even should their claims be well founded. The eighth Tennessee and the first and second California districts are not in the table, being classified still as doubtful, leaving 128 seats to be added to the columns according to later returns.

In the present house, with a membership of 557, the Republicans have 41 majority. Under the new apportionment, the 58th house will consist of 587 members, a majority of which is 194.

BIG FLOW OF GAS

Lucky Strike Made by Dunwich Oil and Gas Company.

Dutton, Nov. 6.—On Monday a strong vein of gas was struck by the drillers on the Dunwich Oil and Gas Company's property, not far from the other oil wells of the company. When the drill was removed there was a tremendous flow of gas, which drove stones and mud from 30 to 60 feet in the air. The hole was only put down 25 feet. The company look upon this strong flow of gas as a sure indication of the presence of oil. Other wells in the neighborhood are down some 350 or 400 feet, and the striking of this gusher at a depth of 125 feet is looked upon as a most promising circumstance.

Outside Stornoway, in the Island of Lewis, is a farmer who brings his horse and cart into the town of Stornoway on market days. Whenever he reaches the inn a quart of beer in pawter is placed before his steed, who

drinks it leisurely without ever spilling a single drop, and no amount of persuasion will ever induce Mr. Horse to "have another"—a temperate example which might well be followed by his masters.

BOTH FOUND DEAD IN PASTOR'S STUDY

Preacher and a Young Woman Asphyxiated.

OMAHA PEOPLE ARE PUZZLED

Don't Know Whether Their Death Was Accidental or the Result of Suicide.

Omaha, Neb., Nov. 5.—Rev. W. G. Rabe, pastor of the German Baptist Church, and Miss Augusta Busch, a young woman, living in the neighborhood, were found dead early today in the pastor's study. The two bodies were locked in embrace, and the gas jets were turned on, but not burning.

Rev. Mr. Rabe was 55 years of age, and a prominent minister.

Miss Busch was missionary pastor of the church. She came here five years ago from a Chicago missionary college and had worked with Rev. Mr. Rabe since. Last night she did not return to her home as usual, and the janitor of the church, at whose home she lived, started in search of her. In the pastor's room at the rear of the pulpit he discovered the dead bodies. The room was filled with illuminating gas. A gas stove was turned on full force as were also several gas jets.

It is believed to be a case of double suicide. Rev. Mr. Rabe accepted the call to this city last January, coming from Buffalo, N. Y. He was popular with his congregation, and was considered an exemplary pastor. He leaves a widow and one son, both of whom reside in New York City, where his wife is attending a missionary college.

The parishioners scout the idea of suicide, and believe it was an accident. It is believed that the pair were found, which was used as a study, were found an open letter religious books and papers.

ANOTHER ACCOUNT.

Another dispatch says: There seems to be little doubt that death was accidental. It is believed that the pair had fallen asleep, the stove flames blew out and the gas escaped. The bodies were rigid and death evidently occurred during the early hours of the previous evening. Miss Busch roomed at the house of Janitor Bernades, and Mr. Rabe at the house of Harry Dirken. Miss Busch went to the Dirken house yesterday morning, and remained there until about 9 in the evening, engaged in sewing. She left for her home at 11, and it is thought probable she met Mr. Rabe on her way, and that the two went to his study in the rear of the church, where the tragedy occurred. They had been good friends, but no strong feeling was apparent to those who knew them.

Mrs. Bernades supposed the dead woman was in her room until Mrs. Schalk, housekeeper for Mr. Rabe, reported that he had not been at home during the night. Then it was discovered that Miss Busch had not returned to her room, and a search was made there this morning. The janitor went to the pastor's study and found the door locked and the key on the inside, and he detected the escaping gas. Quickly he summoned a police officer and the door was broken open. In the center of the very small study the bodies of the two were found. The woman's face was covered with froth and had begun to turn purple. One gas jet above the pastor's table was partly turned off, and from a stove gas was slowly escaping. It was thought at first the two had committed suicide, for on the table was an open letter, a neatly arranged bouquet, Mr. Rabe's watch and glasses and his hat. Miss Busch's gloves and handkerchief, and neatly folded on the back of a chair was her jacket.

INVOLVED IN MYSTERY.

The letter was written in German, and when translated was found to be an answer to another letter which Mr. Rabe had received. There was nothing in it to indicate that the two had intended taking their lives. Around the front and side of the church building a large crowd of church members stood sorrowing and weeping, as the bodies were taken from the building.

Mr. Rabe was 54 years of age and came to Omaha from Buffalo, N. Y., where he was chosen pastor of the German Baptist Church. In that state he left a wife who is attending a missionary school and one son. Carl. He was held in high esteem by his congregation.

Miss Busch was 31 years of age, and had been a missionary in Omaha for the last five years. She came here from Chicago, sent by the Church Missionary Society. She was held in high esteem, and was very popular. She had a brother, believed to be in Michigan, but for some time she had had no trace of him, and his address is unknown to her friends. Her trunk, containing many letters, which may probably lead to the location of her relatives, has been taken charge of by the coroner.
