serious proposition to say that Sir Michael Hicks-Beach had not exempted Canada from the operation of the breadstuff tax because of the action of the present government of Canada. "Have you ever asked them?"

Sproule asked. "That," replied Mr. Fielding, "is not the point. Up to the present it has not been opportune to do so." The tax was essentially a war tax, and while everybody in Canada agreed that a preference would be beneficial, the Liberal party had taken the ground that the preference would be a benefit to Canada, and at the same time to inupon the idea of a preference to Canada in return. In 1896 nobody looked seriously upon the question of getting a preference in the British market. Mr. W. B.
