FRANCE'S OLDEST SUBJECT

AGED 105, is a Hawk of Sweeping Brooms.

London, July 28.—It is alleged that the oldest man in France is Ignace Botta, who lives at Cannes. In a few days he will attain the age of 105 years. The old man is far from prosy. He is merely a maker of small sweeping brooms. These he hawks every day, winter and summer, up and down the streets of Cannes, and sells to housewives.

Botta, who is a strong, rugged man, is an absolute invalid. Being unable to afford meat and dainties, he lives on bread, rubbed with garlic and fruit, occasionally treating himself to a glass of wine. He sleeps in a stable, but chiefly in a stable, where he is allowed a straw bed. He has paid no taxes for years. Furthermore, Botta never asks alms, has never been in prison nor in the hands of the police, and his character is flawless. He was for a time a beggar, but he refused the alms, and he could not stand the restrictions placed on his personal liberty, so he returned to his wanderings and his sweeping brooms.

Sometimes he grows melancholy and thinks of suicide, but his religious sense and scruples prevent him from taking his own life.

HICKS' GUESSES.

For the wind-up of July, Rev. Irl Hicks says that the 12-year-old daughter and 28th reactionary storm conditions will return with more than ordinary intensity.
