Kipling believed, he said, that man was a success when his truest natural instincts were developed, and he looked upon the Britisher as the "finest human animal on earth." Thus the Briton had an inherent right to rule, and an inherent duty to protect The Government of Quebec through pire a map and made it a fact."

Kipling, therefore, did not found his faith in the British Empire upon wealth, civilizaton and fighting power of Britain, but upon the national character of her people. The speaker then drew an interesting comparison between three ancient empires, and that of Britain, in order to show what hope Kipling held up for the continued existence of the latter. The Chinese Empire had been founded upon that great system of ethics, Confucianism. but this had, in the long run, crushed truest human instincts of the

Chinese and left them servile, self-in-volved and non-progressive. The Greeks had idealized art and had given he world a high form of civilization but in doing so they had neglected the more practical and fundamental stincts of human nature, and had failed on account of their very ideality. The Romans had given the world conception of law, but had crushed the more generous and uplifting of human instincts, and had denerated into brutalty and sensualty. Unlike these defunct empires, the British Empire was not founded upon any systems of art, science or philoso phy, but upon the strong character of its people. As fundamental parts of this character were the true colonizing instinct and the spirit of daring and adventure which had always characterized the commercial and exploratory enterprises of the nation. CUSTOMS COLLECTIONS

The customs collections at the port of London for February amounted to \$72,029 34, as compared with \$71,307 89 during the same month of 1904, show ing an increase of \$721 45.
