Detroit, Nov. 13, 1909. His Worship Mayor Stevely, Mayor of London, Ontario:

Dear Sir,-1 regret that circumstances have prevented an oppor-tunity of meeting with you and the councillors of London in connection with the question of the London and Port Stanley lease, regarding which I wrote you some time ago. My time has been taken up on

the reorganization of the C., H. and D. Railway, and other important matters, leaving little or no chance to consider the question of this lease.

My idea is that the cost of the bridges over the Thames and Kettle Creek should be paid by the city of London, and my contention is justified by the terms of our present contract. With this question disposed of, we were, as per the advice of Mr. Pyeatt, willing to extend the lease for twenty years under terms and conditions set forth and considered in lease passed by council in 1901. As this proposition, informally discussed with you, did not appear satisfactory. I beg to suggest that the matter be dropped, as in the face of recent value the L. and P. S. R. property is very likely to be further affected before the expiration of our present lease. Yours truly, WM. COTTER.
