## WOULD CUT LOSE FROM PRIVY COUNCIL

Montreal, July 29.—Mr. W. E. Raney, C. of Toronto, who worked so gallantly in the interests of the Miller bill at the last session of the Federal Parliament, reported at Montreal on his way back from London last night, and expressed himself as highly favoring any movement by which Canada could cut herself adrift from the highest court in the realm, after his experience before the judicial committee of the Privy Council. The suit he was defending was \$2,000, with the legal expenses in connection with it at least \$5,000.

The ability and integrity of the highest court, Mr. Raney said, was above criticism, but they frequently displayed ignorance and misunderstanding as to the conditions in Canada.

### JUDGE BARRON ILL.

Toronto, July 29.—Judge Barron, of Stratford, was taken suddenly ill yesterday and was unable to attend the sitting of the Toronto railway conciliation board, of which he is the chairman. He was confined to his bed, and the physician who was called said that he was suffering from an attack of appendicitis. It will not be necessary to operate at present, but Judge Barron will have to remain in bed for several days before he can travel to his home.

## KENT HOG RAISERS HELPED BY STRIKE

Prices Took a Boost From \$5.50 to \$6.00.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Chatham, July 30.—As a direct result of the Grand Trunk strike, the farmers of Kent County are receiving \$9 per cwt. for live hogs. Before the strike was declared hogs were steady at \$8.50, with a tendency towards a drop, but as soon as the strike was on the price took a boost, and now the buyers are taking all they can get at \$9. Kent hogs are being shipped out on the C. P. R. and other lines, while in some of the other hog-raising districts only the Grand Trunk lines touch, so that hogs from these places cannot be delivered.

Word was received here from Windsor that William DeGroat, a colored resident of this city, was dying in Hotel Dieu. He fell off a freight train in the Windsor yards, and his legs were almost severed. DeGroat is well-known here. He was about 28 years old, and was married. The Chatham Retail Merchants' Association have decided to hold their annual picnic on Aug. 16 or 18. It will take place either at Erie Beach or at the Thames lighthouse. The steamer Ossington may be chartered to take the merchants to the lighthouse.

TWO TO BE DEPORTED. Ottawa, July 29.—Conrad and Woods, the two prisoners sentenced a year ago for the theft of 100 diamond rings from the store of Messrs. McMillan, Sparks street, will be released tomorrow. The sentence of one year expires today and the two much-talked-of men will be escorted across the border by officials of the immigration department.

## A Bolt Stunned Five Farmers

[Special to The Advertiser.] Stratford, July 29.—A violent electrical storm swept over this district this afternoon and wrought considerable havoc to standing crops. A cheese factory on the Northern Gravel road, Ellice Township, about three miles from the city, was struck about 3 o'clock this afternoon, stunning six men. The bolt struck the making room, ripped off a number of rafters, came down the siding and burned a hole two feet square in the side of the wall. About \$75 damage was done. The cheesemaker, Herb Hastings, and John Martin, John Forbes, John Davis, John Dempsey and John Dempsey, five farmers taking refuge from the storm, were all rendered unconscious by the shock. They quickly came to, and extinguished the fire.

## Spain Breaks With the Vatican

San Sebastian, Spain, July 30.—At the conclusion of a conference last evening between King Alfonso and Premier Canalejas it was announced that Marquis Emilio de Ojeda, Spanish ambassador to the Vatican, had been recalled. At the same time the opinion was expressed that a rupture with the Vatican is inevitable. Senor Canalejas told the king that the Government could not accept the conditions of the Vatican's last note, and that the Vatican would not be informed. Premier Canalejas will continue his anti-clerical programme, counting on the support of King Alfonso.

## CHARGED WITH THEFT IN A TORONTO COURT

Walsh Brothers, With Tickets for London, Are Allowed Out On Bail.

Thomas Walsh, directly from California, claimed that following the picked-up acquaintance of two other young fellows at a downtown hotel in Toronto on Thursday afternoon, and a few friendship-cementing drinks together, he slept, and two hours later missed his roll of bills, \$245, in denominations of the National Bank of Los Angeles. They had been in an inside vest pocket.

Detective Taylor was sent on the lookout, but in the meantime two Walsh brothers, David and Edward, of 122 King east, had been taken to the Parkdale police station on charges of drunkenness. Tickets on them for London, Ont., and \$150. On inquiry was made at headquarters if anybody had been robbed, and the charge against the brothers was dropped. White identified the two as his afternoon companions, but they told of furniture sold to account for the big roll. The bills were on the Los Angeles bank.

The men did not plead, but asked for a week's remand. It was allowed, bail being fixed at \$500 each.

## TRADE IS ACTIVE BUT STRIKE HANICAPS

Bradstreet's Report From Chief Distributing Points of the Dominion.

Montreal reports to Bradstreet's say in nearly all lines of trade there continues a fairly active tone and the volume of general business moving has shown little change during the week. The Grand Trunk Railway strike has been a serious factor in the movement of freight. Trains are at present running regularly and there are, at present, no indications of a settlement. The company has reopened its locomotive and general repair shops. There is still holiday tone in wholesale and retail trade, a fair amount of sorting business in seasonal lines is noted. While opinions regarding fall trade still vary in character, a more optimistic tone seems to be making itself felt. Crops were better than expected in Ontario, Quebec and the Eastern Provinces are promising exceedingly well, and from the west indications of an average total yield are reassuring. In this province the hay crop is an unusually good one and is being safely gathered in. City retail trade is active and that in the country is of normal proportions. Receipts of produce continue good. Exports of cheese are large and prices are generally steady to firm. Collections continue slow and banks are tightening up on credits.

Steady at Toronto. Toronto reports to Bradstreet's say retail trade continues steady in character and the volume of general business moving is about normal for this time of the year. Holidays are having the usual effect upon wholesale trade generally, and the G. T. R. strike has been a pronounced factor in restricting shipments of goods. The company is now moving a fair amount of freight and threatened shortages of ice, meat and fruit would seem to be averted. The greatest sufferers by reason of its continuance are many small Ontario towns, for whom the G. T. R. forms the only means of connection with the outside world. The sorting movement of general lines continues good. The summer resort trade is excellent, but up to the present tourist traffic has been on the light side. The outlook for fall continues excellent. Ontario crops are generally better, and the farmers look forward to harvesting a particularly good yield of fall wheat.

## Sanatorium Damaged

At the new Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Byron a large number of shingles were blown off the roof of the doctor's cottage, and scattered about the grounds.

The big marquee tent at the bowling green, which stood Sunday's storm, was blown over while several people were in it. A gasoline stove, which was used for making tea and cooking, had just been extinguished. Something, however, started a fire, but the blaze was put out before any damage was done. Throughout the city the rain fell in sheets, and in a short time the pavements resembled rivers. The street gang had a busy time of it opening the manholes above the sewers. When they were opened the water poured in a thin stream for an hour. Notwithstanding reports come from all parts of the city that cellars were flooded, and the board of works will probably be notified of many cases where damage has occurred. Mayor Beattie and Chairmen of the Board have received many calls as a result of both yesterday's storm and that of Sunday.

## Stage Overturned

While the Delaware stage was returning yesterday afternoon to the storm zone and encountered such fierce gusts of wind that the stage was overturned, but had to turn out in the dry goods store and right the vehicle before it could proceed.

Ottawa, July 30.—For the benefit of the board of control, Taylor McVeety, city solicitor, has decided after much research that tomatoes should be classed as vegetables and not fruit, a question that has been agitating fruit dealers and Ottawa generally for the past week or so.
