FIRE CHIEF AITKEN
MAY HAVE AUTOMOBILE
No. 3 Committee Decided to
Call For Tenders
For One.

Fire Chief Aitken may have an au-
tomobile.
At the meeting of No. 3 committee
last night it was decided to call for
prices for a runabout and a new
buggy.

The chief has been in a couple of
accidents of late, with the result that
his rig is practically of little use. Ten-
ders were received to repair the buggy,
the lowest being \$104.
"That is a lot of money to put into
an old rig," declared Ald. Donnelly.
Ald. Ashplant then figured on the
cost of an auto. The chief's rig cost
\$735 to equip it—\$175 for the buggy,
\$250 each for two horses, and \$50 for
a set of harness.
The cost of maintenance would run
up to \$200 annually, a considerable
item.

"It costs a great deal of money to
keep horses nowadays," said Ald. Ash-
plant. "The auto can be maintained
much cheaper, and I think it would be
wise if the committee considered the
advantage of purchasing a machine.
We can get one for about the same
amount, or a trifle more perhaps than
a new outfit for the chief. We could
use the horses for the department, as
we need two more."

The members of the committee con-
sidered it a proper course to obtain
prices on a runabout for the depart-
ment, and this will be done.
In the meantime, Chief Aitken was
instructed to make temporary arrange-
ments for rig to drive in.

IS PLUMBING INSPECTOR
NECESSARY IN LONDON?

City Architect Nutter Says That
Such Is the Case.

City Architect Nutter, at the meet-
ing of No. 3 committee held last
night, reported on what he termed the
necessity of a plumbing inspector for
London, and advised the appointment
of such an official.

His report recommended that:

1. The present bylaw governing the
inspection of plumbing be repealed,
and a more up-to-date bylaw intro-
duced.

2. That an examining board to ex-
amine plumbers be formed to consist
of the city architect, the city en-
gineer and a master plumber of ten
years' experience.

3. That all practicing plumbers be
examined and registered as master
plumbers, and certificates be issued to
all qualifying.

4. That the fees be as follows: Ex-
amination \$1, registration master
plumber \$10, journeyman \$5, annual il-
lense for master plumber \$5, jour-
neyman \$2.

5. That plans of all new work or al-
terations of existing work be filed in
the department, and that permits for
all such work be issued by the depart-
ment.

6. That no fee be charged for per-
mits, but that a fee for each examina-
tion and test of the work be charged.
If other tests be necessary, owing to
defective work, a fee of \$1.25 should
be charged for the first test, \$1.50 for
the second test, and so on until the
work is satisfactory. If the work is
found defective, the number of ex-
aminations and tests required.

7. That the permits be issued by the
building inspector, and that an assist-
ant building inspector be appointed,
whose duties would be to act as
plumbing inspector in particular, and
assist in the inspection of buildings
generally.

Who Will Pay This?
Mr. Nutter estimated that the fees
from the office the first year would be
\$235, and the subsequent years \$500.

"This is rather a big sum," said
Ald. Ashplant. "I have heard that the
Plumbers' Union that the fees would
be \$1,000, and that the office would be
self-supporting. I think, by the way,
that a report from Mr. Nutter on the
cost of the office, including the man's
salary, as well as a draft of the by-
law necessary to be submitted to the
council."

After some discussion, it was decid-

200 MORE LIGHTS
FOR LONDON STREETS

City Engineers Will Make In-
spection and Decide Upon
the Locations.

Superintendent Glubitz and City
Engineer Wright will go over the street
lighting system, and make a recom-
mendation where 200 more lights
should be located.

This will be done on Friday even-
ing, and on Monday night a report will
be submitted to be ready for the city
council. At the meeting of No. 3
committee last night the matter was
brought to the attention of the ad-
ministration.

Tenders for wiring the market
house were received, the lowest being
that of the Electrical Construction
Company, who submitted a price of
\$306 for the work.

Ald. Ashplant declared that there
was no money in the estimates for
this, but he thought it should be done.
On motion of Ald. Wilson, it was
decided to pay half the cost of wiring
the building provided that the tenants
of the building paid the rest.

Superintendent Glubitz thought a
better plan would be to ask the ten-
ants to pay 10 cents a month extra rent
for the stalls, and in that way the
whole cost would be met.

However, the committee will
make an effort to have the tenants
pay half the cost.

Oil on Street.
It was decided to purchase sufficient
oil to oil the east side of Richmond
street from Oxford to St. James, as
an experiment with oil roads.

"That is a good stretch of road," said
Engineer Wright. "We can water one
side, and oil the other, and the ad-
vantages or disadvantages of oiling the
streets can be readily seen."

Ald. Tancock favored the experi-
ment, and made a motion to that ef-
fect, which was carried.

Ald. Wilson called the attention of
the committee to the fact that there
were practically no hydrants north
and east of Maitland and Cheapoile.

DOWN EAST GRANGERS

Head of the Organization Would Pre-
fer Annexation.
Washington, May 11.—Annexation of
Canada instead of reciprocity was ad-
vocated yesterday by George S. Ladd,
of the Massachusetts State Grange, at
the senate finance committee hearing
on the Canadian reciprocity bill. Mr.
Ladd argued against any trade agree-
ment, declaring if one were made it
should be of control to reply to the de-
mands of the two hundred linemen
employed in installing the hydro-
electric system in the city for an in-
crease in their wages of four cents an
hour, the Electrical Workers' Union at
the Labor Temple last night voted to
go on strike next Tuesday night if
their representations are ignored till
then.

TO HELP ALBANIANS
A Foreign Legion of Ten Thousand
Men Being Organized.

London, May 11.—A staff correspon-
dent of the Daily Chronicle writes
from Rome, giving an interview with
General Ricciotti Garibaldi, who as-
serts that he has enrolled a legion of
10,000 men, including Italians, Eng-
lishmen, Americans and Frenchmen,
to fight in behalf of the Albanians in
the struggle against Turkey. Each man
is to contribute a minimum of \$15
while the sympathizers in the United
States, England and Italy are to sub-
scribe for the purchase of arms.

The correspondent says that the
Italian Government is alarmed and
adopting vigorous measures, searching
for concealed arms and watching the
ports to prevent the embarkation of
Garibaldian adherents, but sympathy
for the Albanians is so strong that the
Government hesitates to arrest the
leaders, or to suppress the Albanian
committees which have been for-
med throughout Italy for fear of
turning the national anger against the
cabinet.

SUES WESTMINSTER.
St. Thomas, Ont., May 11.—James
Dickle, an employee of Alex. McNeil,
farmer, of Southwold, yesterday en-
tered an action for \$2,500 against the
township of Westminster for injuries
received while driving to St. Thomas
several weeks ago, when his horse
fell into a defective culvert and
Dickle was thrown out and seriously
injured.

CABOOSE JUMPS TRACKS
Three Men Killed in Railway Wreck
Near Toledo.

Toledo, Ohio, May 11.—Three men
were killed, one fatally hurt and 11
others seriously injured, when the
caboose on a work train on the Lake
Erie and Western Railroad jumped
the track near Erlin, five miles from
Promont, last night. Nearly all the
killed and hurt were Hungarian labor-
ers, with the exception of P. J. Donlin,
35, brakeman, of Lima. Donlin re-
ceived injuries of such nature that
his death is looked for momentarily.

The train was said to be running at
high speed when the caboose left the
tracks. Those killed were pinned
under the car. The body of Christe
Lembo was buried in sand and not dis-
covered until other workmen saw his
right hand protruding. Three of the
injured may die.
