STREET RAILWAY EXTENSIONS TO BE COMPLETED SOON

Crossover at Adelaide Street To Be Put in Very Shortly.

New Schedule To Be Put in Operation at an Early Date.

Work in the construction of the exension of street railway lines in the orth end of the city has been started with a vigor, and Fuesday there were with a vigor, and Tuesday there were about 40 men working on Huron street taking up part of the old line.

The company intends to rush the work to completion, and as soon as the weather permits the cross-over at the Adelaide street crossing of the C. P. R. will be put in.

Finished Last Fall. The line along Cheapside street to William, and down to Oxford, was fin-ished late last fall, and a stub service has been run over it for several months. As soon as the line down Adelaide street from Oxford to Central avenue is constructed, a new schedule will be prepared y the company, and Oxford cars, instead f running on Oxford street, will run ever the cheapside loop, alternating in opposite directions on the line. New Switches.

New switches will be put in at the corner of Dundas and Adelaide streets, and the Ottaway cars will turn north at Adelaide and Richmond streets to Oxford, and continue the loop east and west on Oxford street. Extra cars will be added, and a two-way service will be

The South London belt line car not run around Central avenue, but will go east on Dundas street as far as the loop at the corner of Quebec street.

Toronto, March 19. — Four hundred members of the Ancient Order of United Workmen from all over the Province are in important conclave at the Temple building here today in the 35th annual convention, and the allimportant question of increase in rates will occupy a two days' session.
