CONGRESS ALONE CAN PREVENT STRIKE

President of States Will Present Grave Situation to Congress This Afternoon-May Legislate to Prevent Great Industrial War.

Washington, D.C., Aug. 29.—The statement presented to President Wilson by the committee of eight, denies that the judgment of society favors an eight-hour day, and declared that arbitration is the only proper way of settling industrial disputes.

The suggestion of President Wilson for a proposal including the principle of the eight-hour day, but postponing its effectiveness for a year pending investigation, was rejected by the railroad executives at the conference this morning. The action of the railroad presidents, taken in connection with the strike order of the employees, left President Wilson no alternative but to so to Congress in a fivel of order.
