Isaac McIllhenny Is Suddenly Stricken by Blindness in a Strange Land.

FINDS "Y" REAL HOME

Worked in West, Came to London To Be Near Friends.

Stricken with almost total blindness among strangers more than 3,000 miles from home, and separated by an insurmountable barrier from relatives who are anxious to care for him, is the fate which an unkind destiny has visited upon Isaac McIlhenney, a young Irishman from Donegal, who is now being sheltered by the Y. M. C. A. in this

McIlhenney is a veteran of the world war. He enlisted during the early hostilities in a battalion recruited in his native county, and accompanied it in October, 1915, to France. He fought in the front-line trenches until the armistice was signed, receiving only two leaves of absence during the whole of that time.

On July 1, 1916, his battalion suffered severely, and in the engagement Mc-lithenney received a slashing wound, reaching from immediately below the left eye to the corner of his mouth. In March, 1919, he was discharged and returned to his home in Ireland.

Came to Canada.

By this itme his homeland was seething with discord, and because, with his mother and father dead, he no longer had home ties, McIlhenney decided to seek his fortune in a new and more promising land. Eighteen months ago be trived in Canada and secured a position on a farm in the west.

FALLING STARS ARE EXPLAINED BY ASTRONOMER

Dr. Dearness, Principal of the Local Normal School, Explains Phenomena.

FRAGMENTS OF PLANETS

Declares Increase in Number Has No Connection With Eclipse of Sun.

Many Londoners have commented upon the number of falling stars ob-erved in the skies last night. Toronto astronomers undertake to associate the phenomena in some way with a total eclipse of the sun, which occurs next Saturday, Principal Dearness of London Saturday. Principal Dearness of London Normal School states that the falling stars have no connection with the eclipse. There are numbers of so-called falling stars at all seasons, but at some seasons and in some years they appear to increase. Lost in Space.

One theory is that they are likely to be more numerous when the earth is passing, brough the path of a comet. what are called falling stars are, of course, not really stars. They are frag-ments of matter lost in space, and when the earth speeds around in orbit, with great protecting folds of air around it, these fragments of mat-ter, some of which quite possibly have en lost or shed by comets, become heated by the sudden friction of the moving atmosphere, in which they are caught. The friction heats them to a white brilliance, and usually they shoot across the sky through the earth's outer atmosphere, at a tangent, until they are consumed or again lost in space, they come within too close a drawground, where they are sometimes found

s meteors.
Some of these meteors are the size of huge boulders. Their outer surface appears burned over the more volatile elements being burned out to form com-pounds with the earth's atmosphere. Drilling the untouched heart of these great meteors, however, mineralogists discover that they are composed of similar elements and minerals to those found on the earth.

It is quite probable that those lost fragments of matter away out in space have some motion or orbit of their own states Prof. Dearness. Completely isolated or marooned in space, those mineral bodies either remain motionless around in directions of motion scientists have not yet definitely deter-



London, Sept. 26.-The German Government is charged with still deliberately evading the peace treaty as regards the size of the German army in a special article, which is the feature of today's issue of the London Times. Instead of observing the limitations under the treaty of the army to 100,000, Germany, according to the article, which the newspaper says is based on "unimpeachable information," is attempting to make provision to clothe, house and equip 800,000 men.
