

Marcel Nilles in 8th But Makes Points Showing

Carpentier K.O.'s Nilles But Is Groggy In Second

Former French Idol Still Champion, But Sorry One-Mouth Being Open and Was Dazed In Second, But Nilles Lacked Initiative.

Paris, May 6.—George Carpentier knocked out Marcel Nilles in the eighth round of their scheduled 10-round bout for the French heavyweight title this afternoon.

Although he won, Carpentier, according to ring observers, added nothing to his reputation. It was noticeable that the old Carpentier spirit was lacking.

Georges was in difficulty as early as the second round and weathered the third only through the inexperience and lack of combativity of his opponent.

The experts opined that Carpentier's attempt to stage a come-back, although it ended in a victory, was a failure to demonstrate any of the fighting qualities required of a champion, and that had the former French idol been facing the real batter, the fight would have ended in the second round, with Georges the loser.

In the second Nilles had the former champion groggy with body blows, but he lacked the will to finish his man who, with wide open mouth, looked the picture of defeat.

Forty thousand persons saw the two heavyweights crawl through the ropes. They gave Carpentier a great ovation; his popularity seemed greater than ever. Georges appeared to be in much better condition than when he fought the former Siki. Evidently he had trained hard for the fight, but he appeared to lack the confidence he had in the former encounter, keeping on the defensive throughout the first round, instead of assuming a tiger-like offensive.

The first round was a succession of clinches, with Nilles playing for the body and Carpentier misusing several hard swings.

Carpentier momentarily abandoned his offensive for the stomach in the second and reached Carpentier with a hard right to the jaw and had Georges groggy at the bell, although Carpentier had opened a cut over Nilles' right eye with a glancing right, which he continued was trying to put over for a knockout.

Nilles also had the better of the third round and should have ended the fight in this period.

In the fourth round, Nilles kept playing for the stomach. Carpentier, evidently in great pain, was unable to cover, clinching whenever possible. It was Nilles' round.

In the fifth Carpentier got in a left to the jaw, but the blow was without any steam. Also, Nilles jabbed Carpentier four times with lefts to the face without a return and the referee stepped in.

Carpentier rushed out of his corner in the sixth and uppercut Nilles, the blow landing on the forehead. Nilles dropped and the floor, claiming a foul. The referee, Leon Bernstein, would not allow the

claim and Nilles, after he had taken a count of nine arose and ended the round, apparently in great distress. He clinched the victor until the bell.

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200 GOEFSERS AT DEAL READY FOR TODAY'S START

Yankee Contingent Are Given a Splendid Chance.

SWEETSER SET As Most Youthful American Champion Will Be in the Spotlight.

Sandwich, Eng., May 6.—The battle for the British amateur golf championship will begin tomorrow at Deal, in a field where the warriors with iron and wood clubs will aggregate almost 200 of the most skilled players in the United Kingdom and the United States.

There is a general feeling that the threat to take the title across the Atlantic to the United States had a good chance of success.

Among the strong English players in the upper half are Roger Wethered, Cyril Tolley, Bernard Darwin, C. C. Aylmer, Mr. Tweedale, Holderness, the British title-holder, Dr. H. G. Gillies and MacKenzie. The Scott brothers and the Torrance brothers are bunched in the upper half.

Among the stars from the United States who will compete for the title are Francis Ouimet, Dr. O. F. Willing, Robert Gardner, Jesse Sweetser, Robert Hunter and H. S. Lake.

Nilles apparently was still in great pain. Carpentier swung lefts and rights to the head, opening cuts over both his opponent's eyes. Nevertheless he was unable to bring Nilles down, his blows lacking the necessary force.

In the eighth, Nilles rushed into a clinch and Carpentier pushed him off and swung his right to the jaw. Nilles dropped and was counted out, amid mingled cheering and hooting from the spectators.

Nottingham and West Ham go into first division.
