

London, Nov. 27 .- Winter, reaching an icy hand, laid a tribute on the bier of the gentle Alexandra, Britain's queen-mother, today, covering her casket with a fleecy mantle of snow as it was trundled on a gun carriage from the Chapel Royal, in St. James's Palace, to Westminster Abbey, where

Thus the sea king's daughter departed from the capital of her adopted empire as she had entered it, for the snow was also falling on that distant day, 62 years ago, when she came from Denmark to be the bride of Edward VII.
