

BRITAIN SUGGESTS CHALLENGES FOR ELLIS ISLAND

BRITISH COMMISSIONERS DISCUSS SITUATION AT ELLIS ISLAND

Auckland Geddes Suggests Changes To Relieve the Congestion.

ASK U. S. CONSENT

London, July 10.—Ellis Island was up for discussion in the British House of Commons again yesterday. The British consul, Mr. J. M. Patterson, secretary for foreign affairs, in answer to questions, said Sir Auckland Geddes, British ambassador to Washington, had inspected the island a month ago at the invitation of the United States government, to which government he had communicated his impressions. The ambassador had made no secret of his conviction that the only way of effectively relieving the congestion would be to build an entirely new station or supplement the existing one by creating an additional station to which certain classes of immigrants could be diverted.

Asked whether he would lay a copy of the ambassador's report on the table, the under-secretary said he would have to seek the consent of the United States government. Captain Viscount Curzon inquired if it would not be possible to gain the United States government's consent for examination of "migrants at ports of departure instead of awaiting their arrival at Ellis Island, but Mr. McNeill said he wanted notice given answering the question. He gave no answer to another question whether he inquired it was possible to refer the matter to the League of Nations.

PRESENTED WITH GIFTS BY FRIENDS AT EMBRO

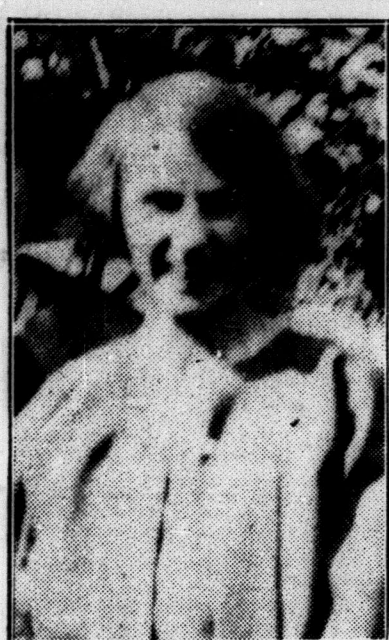

LOG BOOK OF BALLOON BEARS MUTE TESTIMONY OF ILL-FATED JOURNEY

Records of Lieut. Roth and Companion Show Craft Evidently Caught in Storm off Pelee Island. Entries Previously Carefully Registered, End on Thursday at 11 o'clock.

Port Stanley, July 9.—The story of the last trip of the ill-fated navy balloon A6698, which ended in disaster and the death of the two balloonists, is vividly told in the log book of the balloon, which has just come to light.

Records Remained Hidden.

The records of the long journey from Indianapolis to Pelee Island, where the craft was evidently caught in a storm, remained hidden from the eyes of the searching party until they were discovered late this afternoon by a reporter from The Advertiser.

The pages had been glued together by the water of the lake, which soaked the book from cover to cover and though the pages had been turned time and again, the message pencilled every few minutes during the trip, hitherto remained undiscovered. The words were so faint they could hardly be read.

The progress of the racing balloon was carefully recorded by Lieut. Roth, until 11 o'clock Thursday morning, when an entry above Lake Erie, noted the fact that the craft was to be high up above Lake Erie, Pelee Island. Then the story ended.
