dreamt that at the first port at which  
he called the customs officers would  
suddenly demand that his schooner be  
sounded, but such is the case. Accord-  
ing to advices from Honolulu, the Laura  
has arrived there 30 days from Van-  
couver, and has been taken in custody  
by officers, who charged that there was  
a suspicion that the schooner was in-  
fected with the plague. The schooner  
was denied the allegation, and said  
that he and his party were in a pleasure  
trip to the islands of the Southern Sea.  
He also said that he had 200 cases of  
salmon on board for provisions, and now  
some of the customs men want to open  
the salmon tins to look inside to ascer-  
tain whether the contents are Fraser  
sockeye or Chinatown dace. When  
the mail steamer left, preparations were  
being made to thoroughly investigate the  
schooner for contraband, and the  
pleasure party, if indicated, the  
search must proceed, for the customs  
men is king.
