## BONAVENTURE SOLDIER

### DIED IN WEST

Remains Were Brought to His Home, Escumac, for Burial March 9th.

Shoreham, Sussex, Feb. 24th, 1917.

Dear Miss Marquai:—

I hope you will pardon delay in acknowledging receipt of stockings and cigarettes sent the Dalhousie boys by your Institute. By the time these arrived the land had been broken up and two drafts had gone to France and the 42nd Highlanders and the second to the 8th Montreal Battalion and were training behind the firing line for the greater struggle of their lives.

I was in France at the time and consequently it was late in January before I could unpack the box and mail the presents to the men. I suppose you have received acknowledgments from many by this time. I want to thank the Institute for mine and on behalf of the boys, especially those who may be in the front line, not to be able to reply, for life is uncertain in this game.

One hundred and four Senior officers were sent to France on a Course of Instruction, and then to be used on these Reserve Battalions which are formed on the English System. We had our Christmas in La Havre in France and the first day of 1917 was spent in the front line of trenches in Northern France. I shall never forget this day and the day following. On the second day Fritz got busy and threw all kinds of articles at us, thinking he had it all his own way, until noon, when the Canadian Artillery opened up with what they have. They threw such a variety of "Peace Proposals" at the Huns that they were glad to shut up and repair damaged trenches. We had all the experience of trench life, except going over "No Man's Land" in "Raids" which are the usual pastime there.

It was a great experience for us, but after three weeks, orders come to return to England for duty. We shall have more of this later, for time will draw us all into the great Maelstrom now surging in one of the fairest Countries of the world, Sunny France. "The Chosen home of chivalry, the garden of Romance."

The first Draft went to the 42nd Highlanders; and the second, to the 87th Battalion. Both of these Battalions are Montreal Unites. I saw the boys of the 42nd Battalion about January 6th. They were happy, well clothed, well fed, and well trained. At that time they had been in the trenches only 42 hours as a "try out" to accustom themselves to conditions vastly different to anything they have ever experienced before. There is

no fear that kind which makes cowards of us all.

They would like to be quiet, but their nature "outrage" drives the duty upon the time. They would like to see the men in the front line, but they will not put on the uniform. They are men of the hour with a philosophy and a theology of their own. I am speaking of the men as I found them in the trenches. One has to be with them to see their true worth in the light of stirring times, live with them to learn their resourcefulness and courage. It is a mighty game and the Canadians know how to play it as well as the best, but the task is great and the foe is strong.

The remnants of the 132nd 104th 100th and 101st B. I. divisions from St. John, 104th and 105th have been made into the 13th Reserve Battalion under Lt. Col. G. W. Fowler of Sussex N. B. to train men and officers to reinforce the 26th New Brunswick Battalion under Lt. Col. A. E. G. McKenzie at the front. We have moved from Bramshott in Surrey to Shoreham in Sussex, the land of the Downs and pleasant undulations.

We had a pleasant surprise a few days ago when we had Lt. Col. McKenzie with us. Erh has done well and if spared will continue to do so. I can assure you we are proud of him here.

The 132nd has disappeared except a few cap badges bear witness to its once existence. No Company officers were sorry when the change came as they were well "fed up."

The boys who went to France have been highly spoken of and some have already given their all. The officers who have taken courses in the various schools have completed most favorably with officers from other Battalions, but one lacked something from the beginning and that was never supplied until the 13th Reserve Battalion was formed.

I would suggest to those who have friends and relations over here and especially in France, write, and keep on writing. You do not know how hard it is for the boys to find time and suitable place to write. It cheers them to hear from home. How nice it is to receive a nice pair of stockings filled with cigarettes, a half dozen handkerchiefs, a tasty cake, some fudge, something they liked when home. You know little if anything about destitution in Canada. Of course the boys are not in want as they are well paid, but it is wonderful the amount of pay that is assigned home by the boys of the 132nd. Some have reserved but little for themselves. Those who came before us have put up the barrier. We shall have to see it is kept up for so many have become too worn and cannot do more.
